**Celebrate Spring with Shortcake**  
Baskets of red-ripe strawberries have become a bright accent on produce shelves the year around. But real berry connoisseurs are partial to the berry grown in their own area. So the top season for strawberry shortcake is the time of the native harvest. For a tender unusual biscuit shortcake use corn starch along with flour.

**Strawberry Shortcake**  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour 1/4 cup margarine  
1/2 cup corn starch 3/4 cup milk  
2 teaspoons baking powder 1/2 pint heavy cream  
1/2 teaspoon salt Strawberries, sweetened  
Sift together flour, corn starch, baking powder and salt into mixing bowl. Mix in margarine until coarse crumbs form. Mix in milk with fork just until dough forms. Gently knead on lightly floured surface 15 times. Roll to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut with floured 2 1/2-inch biscuit cutter. Place on ungreased baking sheet and bake in a 450° F. (very hot) oven until lightly browned, 15 to 20 minutes. Break biscuits apart while warm, but not hot. Whip the cream. Spoon cream on bottom halves. Top with half of berries. Cover with biscuit tops, more whipped cream and remaining strawberries. Makes 10 servings.

### Legion Auxiliary To Celebrate 50th Anniversary

On May 10, 1922 the American Legion Auxiliary of the Emil Jacob Unit, 117 of Manchester, Michigan received their organization Charter from National Headquarters at Indianapolis, Indiana.

This newly organized womens group was provided for by the First National Convention of the American Legion in Minneapolis, Minnesota in November of 1919 and was to include the women of the families of men who had served in World War I. This womens auxiliary was formed to aid the men in carrying forward its activities and to help with phases of work suitably performed by women. Their principle activity being to promote peace and good will on earth; to safeguard and transmit to posterity the principles of justice, freedom and democracy and to aid the American Legion in carrying out their program of service to their country.

The local Auxiliary unit was organized by interested wives, sisters and mothers of men who had served in World War I. Men who had been instrumental in forming the Emil Jacob Post 117 of the American Legion. There were 23 members on their Charter Roll. Mrs. Lee Davison served as the Units first President. Four of the 23 ladies have had continuous membership in the Unit. They are Mrs. Philip Kern, Mrs. Harry Sutton, Mrs. Webster Schill and Mrs. Alvin Clark.

The local Auxiliary has grown from a membership of 23 to the present roll of 91. The Unit now includes women of service men from World War I, World War II, Korean Conflict and VietNam and little daughters and granddaughters have been enrolled to form the Junior Auxiliary.

On Wednesday, May 10, the local Unit will celebrate their 50 years with a potluck dinner at the Legion Hall. The dinner will be served at 6:30 p.m. sharp. All Auxiliary members, their husbands, Junior Auxiliary members and members of the American Legion Post 117 and their wives are cordially invited to attend. A program is being planned for the evening.

Rolls and coffee will be provided by the committee and those attending are urged to bring a dish of food to share and their own table service.

### 4-H Automotive Recognizes Kids and Cars Go Together



SPECIAL: "Kids and cars go together. 'Wheels' carry them to new and exciting places and give them an increasing sense of freedom," says Donald Osburn, director of program services, National 4-H Service Committee.

Young people today are impatient for the time they may receive their driver's license and get behind the wheel of the family car, the committee spokesman notes. And to prepare for the great day is an exciting and popular program which enables young people to learn about cars even before they are old enough to drive - the 4-H automotive program.

Sponsored nationally by The Firestone Tire & Rubber Company and with supervision of the Cooperative Extension Service, adults and older teens teach the members about the basic workings of a car, principles of elementary maintenance and safety, Osburn explained. A new dimension has been added to this year's automotive program, an opportunity to participate in a special defensive driving course which originally was limited to adults.

4-H is the first major youth organization to incorporate DDC in its national program, Osburn reported. South Dakota, one of the first states to adopt a DDC

program (endorsed by the National Safety Council), is highly enthusiastic about what it can accomplish.

"The DDC program is now available to 4-H members 14 years or older who are enrolled in the automotive project as well as to any other youths who wish to take the training," Roy Beard, state 4-H agent, says.

"About half of all traffic fatalities happen to people 25 years old and under," Beard observes. "That statistic alone shows that the defensive driving course is an important addition to the 4-H program," he adds.

Youths enrolled in the 4-H automotive program also have the opportunity to earn other incentives and recognition. Firestone provides funds for four medals of honor to outstanding automotive members in each participating county. Top state award is an all-expense trip to the 51st National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Nov. 26-30.

At a special recognition event during the Congress, eight young people will receive national educational scholarships of \$700 each from the donor.

Individuals or youth groups interested in taking part in the 4-H automotive program and older teens and adults who are interested in qualifying as instructors should contact their county extension office.



# Ask Senator GRIFFIN

To cut through red tape members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert F. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington D.C. 20510.

In 1965, my husband and I became eligible for Medicare. But because we were in good health then we didn't sign up for the doctor's coverage. Since then, my husband has died and my health is beginning to fail. When I tried recently to sign up they told me at the Social Security office that I'm no longer eligible. How can that be?  
—R. L. Mason County

When the original Medicare law was enacted, it imposed a three-year deadline on signing up for Part B physician's coverage. Later, the grace period was extended for only one additional year. Although you are precluded by existing law, there is hope. A bill (H.R. 1)—already passed by the House and now being considered in the Senate Finance Committee, on which I serve—contains a provision that would eliminate the sign-up deadline. If this provision becomes law—and the chances look good—you should be able to enroll before the year is out.

My landlord sent me a notice that my rent is going up from \$150 to \$175 a month. Doesn't that violate the President's Economic Stabilization Program? And what can I do about it?  
—C. R., Calhoun County

The landlord may be in trouble. However, he can legally raise the base rent by 2.5 per cent; and he can reflect increases in taxes as well as the cost of improvements, pre-rated to your unit. There are other exceptions if the landlord lives in the building and there are four or fewer units. If you believe the landlord is in violation, ask for a meeting and request him to explain the rent increase. If he fails to justify it, contact your local Internal Revenue Service office. Be prepared to furnish a copy of the rent hike notification and a detailed statement of your complaint.



**AGRICULTURE IN ACTION BEHIND THE TIMES**

Congress and the Administration are currently very concerned with what the Washington, D. C. press calls "high" food prices and high farm prices. They are conducting all kinds of hearings on the subject to determine what is going on. The press thinks it's big news.

The real truth of the matter is that Washington is way behind the times. The subject under discussion should be the big drop in farm prices.

The most recent official report with the government's own figures shows that prices received by farmers fell two percent in just one month.

Prices received by farmers for hogs are down. So are farm prices for cat-

tle, milk, cotton, lettuce and tomatoes. Farm prices are back down to 72 percent of parity.

Almost nobody talks about the real issue facing agriculture, the high cost of farming. Prices paid by farmers were at the highest level in history last month.

Compared to twenty years ago, the wages farmers pay their employees are two and one-third times higher; farm machinery price levels are nearly double and farm real estate taxes per acre are 3.8 times higher. Farmers, in order to stay in the business of producing food and fiber for the nation, have more than doubled their investments, but find themselves nearly five times deeper in debt.

Perhaps one reason Washington doesn't hold hearings on the high cost of farming is that they just might find out the real cause, that farmers have been hit by inflation and that the federal government's deficit in fiscal 1972 is 38 billion dollars.

Hearings just might disclose that creating that kind of a deficit budget by pumping a lot of government money into the nation's economy caused the inflation.

**ABOUT YOUR HOME**

Most of us have admired the simple beauty of the African-violet. Some of us have tried growing these delicate flowers—but not all of us have had success.

Until I came across a very simple set of rules my violets just seemed to pine away.

Cold is the outstanding enemy of the African violet. Never water with cold water or allow your plant to be in a room below 60 degrees—72 degrees is just about perfect. Avoid chilly drafts.

Water your African-violet by setting the entire pot into a pan containing two inches of water and let it remain there until the surface soil feels damp—not soggy.

Feed the plants a plant food every couple of weeks. The soil should be rich in humus. This can be done by mixing equal parts of sand, compost and rich black soil, or buy this mixture from a nurseryman.

Handle very gently for the leaves are brittle and easily broken. Remove faded flowers and seed pods.

Keep the plants in an east or west window. Strong sunlight should be avoided. —Brush away dust with a soft pastry brush while you support the leaf underneath with your finger tips.

Never allow two crowns to grow in one pot. Usually the crowns can be pulled apart and replanted.

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Mahony reviewed the financial statement for March. Moved by Mahony, supported by Scully that \$1500 be transferred from the General Highway Fund to the Local Street Fund. All yeas, carried. Mahony reported that our assessor had advised him that there would be an increase on our tax roll of approximately \$400,000.

Chief Becktel advised Council that there are still problems occurring because of the bridge detour. People miss the detour signs, particularly at night. The State High way Dept. is providing some signs for use on M-52.

Scully reported on the Chamber of Commerce meeting he had attended. There was some concern over the landfill and the closing of the IGA parking lot. He advised the Chamber that the Village was presently negotiating and has an option on property for use as a landfill. The property is being tested for the State Health Dept. In regard to the IGA parking lot, at most it will be out of use for 2 days when the beams are set on the bridge.

Fitzgerald reviewed the Public Works activities. Asphalt has been patched, street cleaning begun, some

gravel streets graded, additional cover placed on the landfill, and located curb on M-52 for the State Highway Dept. Mrs. Koemke has inquired about curb removal for a driveway as well as the replacement of the existing cut. Mr. Walker has requested curb in front of his home on Adrian Street. Mr. James Palmer complained about water crossing M-52 into his yard and subsequently his basement. There is a need for 8 new tires for the dump trucks which will be purchased as soon as possible.


