

Seldom does the non joiner give the veterans group a second thought. Con tent with his benefits, he pays no credit to those who gained them. In some circles, it is even fashionable to slight them. We have all heard the term professional veteran. That should be in the realm of a compliment. It takes a professional to win something. The organized groups have worked long and hard in the veterans behalf, and they continue to insist, from Capitol Hill to the State houses, on assistance, better hospital care and rightful benefits."

TIME FOR ACTION

In a number of recent court cases across our land, the courts have held, in effect, that reliance on local property taxes to finance public education is unconstitutional under the federal or state constitutions.

The most common agreement in such cases is that a system which makes the level of spending for public education dependent on local wealth violates the equal protection clause of the 14th Amendment of the Constitution of the United States.

Nothing in any of these court decisions indicates that the property tax is an unconstitutional tax; or that spend ing per pupil must be the same in all school districts. The real thing that is in question is the basing of local

Page S

school expenditures on local property

Put this together with the decision of the Michigan Supreme Court on capital outlay projects, such as county and township buildings, etc., where the "sky is the limit" on the amount of property tax that can be leveled to pay off indebtedness. This can be done

without a vote of the people.

The citizens of Michigan may find themselves faced with a double barreled shotgun in the future if action is not

Presently, petititons are being circulated to place on the November 1972 ballot a meaningful and lasting tax reform program through a basic Constitutional change.

The reform program would put a limit on property tax and set forth a breakdown as to amounts that can be levied for various purposes. The petitions also will solve, as nearly as possible, the problem created by the Supreme Court decision.

The citizens of Michigan cannot afford to get into a bind on how our public education will be financed. We still have the opportunity to do something about it by signing these petitions and than let it be decided at the polls in November.





GRIFFIN

To cut through red tape members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington D.C. 20510.

Several months ago, my son came down with salmonella poisoning. Doctors at the hospital told me it could be traced to a pet turtle he bought at a local pet shop. Can't something be done about this?

-M. M., Hamtramck

It's estimated that contaminated pet turtles have caused as many as 300,000 cases a year of salmonella poisoning—a virulent, dangerous form of food poisoning. A few weeks ago, in response to congressional and public pressure, the Food and Drug Administration issued new regulations which now require that any and all turtles shipped across state lines must first be cleaned in a special chemical solution. The solution destroys salmonella bacteria, and experts say this procedure should sharply reduce the incidence of salmonella poisoning.

Earlier this year I paid a tax consultant to help me fill out my Federal income tax return. The other day, a salesman called on me and it sounded like he had some information about my financial situation that he could only have gotten from that tax man. Isn't the information on my tax form supposed to be confidential?

—T. P., Wyandotte

You bet it is! On December 10, 1971, President Nixon signed into law a bill which I strongly supported, making it a Federal crime for anyone engaged in the business of preparing tax returns to disclose information furnished to him for that purpose. If you believe there has been a violation, I suggest you contact the Internal Revenue Service office and ask for an investigation.

My son is a college sophomore. His university has notified him that the cost of room and board in his dormitory will be increased by \$200. What happened to the price

Sorry, there is no price control violation because charges for tuition, room and board at State-operated colleges and universities are exempt. Only those private schools in operation to make a profit are limited now by price controls. The exemption also applies at private, non-profit institutions.
