

Such tension shall not be made after the Fifth Friday nest preceding any election or primary election, (unless such Fifth Friday shell on a legal holiday in which event registration shell be accepted during the next full working day).

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 507. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village and has not recorded such removal with the local Clark shall essente a member of registerion reducet, listing the new residence address thereon over his signature, with the election beard in the precinct in which he is registered at the next entering primary or election. The inspector of election in charge of the registerion records shall compare the signature upon the applicant's registered and, if the signatures correspond, then the inspector shall certify such fact by affixing his initials upon sold region. The applicant for treasfer, after having signed an application to vote as provided in Section 523 of this act, shall then be parameted to vote in such precinct for that primary or election only. The application for transfer shall be filled with the Iownship, City or Village Clark who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any street is a Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township. City or Village Clark to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote.

AGRICULTURE IN ACTION MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU

Many people have been fore casting the economic outlook for the 1972 year. Agriculture has not been exempt from the forecasts.

After the loud objections to and the conformation of the new Secretary of Agriculture, Dr. Butz made his own forecast concerning agriculture's future

Secretary Butz has forecast that gross farm income for 1972 will rise about \$2 billion over the 1971 level to about \$60 billion. He also predicted that net farm income for the year would increase by about \$1 billion to \$16.7 billion. If this happens, it will be an all time high record for both gross farm income and net farm income.

Secretary Butz also forecasted that farm exports, which slumped to roughly \$7 billion in 1971 from \$7.8 billion in 1970, may rise to more than \$8 billion this year, assuming there will be no dock strikes, which played a role in reducing last year's exports.
