

"Feed Mill" Manchester Landmark



By C. Chapin

Standing on the ground near the Mill door is a Vertical Turbine, or mill wheel, a rare opportunity for everyone in the community to see what is happening underwater, to provide power for grinding.

When, in 1826 Major John Gilbert of Ypsilanti, took up this land from the United States Government, he promptly laid out a little settlement, first setting aside the property and water power rights on the river, designating the streets and planning city lots for buildings, then even allowing for a park on the main street, in the manner of the New England

The location and water rights, that is, the right to maintian 12 feet of head water and power for running 2 stone having been sold, then in 1839 Stephen Fargo built the first flouring mill - 1841 and three men, Benjamin Ford, Cyrus Smith and Mr. Truhl held the property for one year, for in 1842 Charles Noble and Austin Wing acquired the property to hold it for twenty-six years. During this period the mill was destroyed and rebuilt at least once. James Fountain owned it from 1866 to 1877 when George Sedgwick ran it for 9 years then in 1886 Noah Holt bought it and had some little financial trouble for it became the property of the Peoples Bank. Lewis Lonier and Wm. Hoffer bought the property in 1902 and built the present dam at about 1912 when Mr. Lonier died in 1919 Mr. William Blaess became a partner and then the final owner after Hoffer passed away in 1930.

During these past few years much touble had came upon the old property, for in 1924 a great fire swept the mill and nearly destroyed the entire downtown area. Rebuilt as a grinding mill at that time it has operated under the direction of Willard Mann & Sons since

For machinery experts we should say that in 1954 the operation was changed from an attrition mill process to a hammer type, and I'll not explain that. Ask Willard!

Below the level of the street and on the river side, lies the flume, which is under water, the depth of this is the

head water, always at the same depth as the pond on the other side of the bridge. There are really three of these wheels even though only one has been used for many years. Having been manufactured by a company in Ohio, still in business, the wheels are dated

1886, 1896, and 1903. The unique quality of our town comes in large part from the fact that we have managed to be progressive without losing our ties to the past, and the sight of wagon loads of grain brought to the Miller for grinding into feed is a normal one for downtown Manchester.

The farmer who orders his bins automatically filled in the same way we order our oil tanks supplied, also takes part in a more modern service.







For one of the few times in our married life, my wife has asked me a question I can't enswer. Can you? What is the difference between Medicare and Medicaid?

Don't feel bad. You'd be surprised how many people write esking for an explanation of the difference. Medicare is a Federal health insurance program for persons 65 and older, run by the Social Security Administration and financed by payroll taxes and monthly premiums, that pays a major portion of non-custodial hospital and medical bills. Medicaid is a joint Federal-State assistance program which provides medical care for needy and low-income persons regardless of age, including the aged, blind, dis-abled and families with dependent children. The extent and type of Medicaid coverage varies from state to state. For more information on these two programs you may wish to write for two free booklets: "Medicaid, Medicare: Which is Which" and "Questions and Answers on Medical Assistance—Medicaid." These are available from the Department of HEW. Medical Services Administration. 4609 HEW South, 330 C Street S.W., Washington D.C.

Members of the Senate and the House of Representatives introduced 26,303 bills in the last full Congress (the 91st-1969-1971). By the way, the record for most bills introduced in a single Congress is held by the 61st Congress (1909-1911). The Members of that Congress introduced 44,363 legislative proposals. Of all the bills introduced in Congress, only about 8% ever become law.



Many farmers are living in a state of apprehension these days, wondering what is going to happen to them

Each time the Price Commission and the Cost of Living Council start talking about rising food prices, farmers expect the worst.

During the last week of June, there were a couple of scares. First, President Nixon removed quotas on meat imports for the rest of this year for the stated purpose of increasing the supply and holding down prices.

The second scare came when the President issued another executive order extending price controls to fruits and vegetables, eggs and seafoods after the first sale. No controls were put on the farm price of these commod-

The Administration stated that it issued this order more to restrict mark-ups and profit margins for middlemen and supermarkets in the food

Livestock and other farm products have been under this type of control since the beginning of Phase II.

THE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE

Egg producers, who have been suffering from drastically low prices for two years, are puzzled as to why their product was included in the new

There is also some concern that the controls over fresh produce at the distributor level could work their way back to the farm level, as wholesale buyers might put increasing price pres-

Americans now spend only 15.6 percent of their after-tax income on food, which is the lowest percentage in the world, according to the U.S.D A. This is down from 20 percent in

Why then the price control gimmick? It's an election year and consumers out number farmers. Apparently neither the Administration or Congress is willing to face up the real cause of inflation and high prices -- excess government spending.




