MICHIGAN FARM BUREAU Pesticides of some kind are used on almost 85 percent of all farms, but farmers account for only slightly more than half of all the pesticides used in the United States. Urban dwellers have as big a stake in the use of pesticides

With the recent ban placed on the use of DDT, we need to remember some of the comments made by Dr. Norman Borlaug, the 1970 Nobel Peace Prize winner, and the only agriculturalist ever to be so honored.

In an address last year, Dr. Borlaug charged environmentalists with a desire to legislate a ban on DDT to prohibit it for any use in the U.S.A. If this happens, Borlaug warned, they almost certainly will start a worldwide propaganda campaign to have it banned everywhere in the world.

"This must not be permitted to happen until an even more effective and safe insecticide is available, " he declared. "As soon as DDT is successfully banned, there will be a push for the banning of all chlorinated hydrocarbons, then, in order, the organic phosphates and carbonate insecticides. Once the task is finished on insecticides, they will attack the weed killers and, eventually, the fungicides.

"If the use of pesticides in the U.S.A. were to be completely banned crop losses would probably soar to 50 percent and food prices would increase four to five fold. Who then would provide for the food needs of the low income groups? Certainly not the privileged environmentalists," stated the honored scientist.

All mankind stands to lose if we jump too fast. We need to seek knowledge and understanding of all the insecticides and pesticides to determine their worth as weighed against any detriment they may have before we jump






Three members of the Finance Committee for the building program now in progress at Saline Community Hospital were pioneering members of the original committee when the hospital was built in the late 1950's.

GRIFFIN

By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can of ten lend a hand to those with problems involving the federa government. From time to time we read that the House of Representatives would select the President if no candidate for President receives an absolute majority of electoral votes in the election. But who would select the Vice President under such circumstances? I told my wife the House of Representatives would do that too. She disagrees, as usual. Please straighten her out.

Your wife wins this argument, at least. If no candidate for Vice President receives a majority of the electoral votes, the Senate (not the House) would choose between the two candidates for Vice President who receive the highest number of electoral votes. The Senate has been required to exercise this responsibility only once in history. In 1836, the Senate chose Richard M. Johnson to serve as Vice President under President Martin Van Buren.

My electric bills are too high. Is there any way we can conserve electricity without being uncomfortable.
