

## "When People Need Help"

"Back home when somebody's in trouble and needs help, everybody pitches in and helps," said Petty Officer First Class Mike Walsh, Mike's hometown is Manchester, Michigan.

This time, however, the people needing help are in Northern and Central Luzon, Republic of the Philippines, and Mike is just as enthusiastic about helping as if it were his hometown.

The need is a result of 30 days of continuous recordbreaking rain that has caused extensive flooding.

All the ills of disaster such as lack of food, loss of homes and crops, and disease have beset the Filipino people in these areas.

In Baguio City in Northern Luzon, nearly 200 inches of rain have fallen during July. In another area, 700 homes were washed away.

"It makes you realize how lucky you are to have enough food, clothing and shelter," said Walsh, a yeoman on the staff of Com-USNavPhil.

With these words, Mike pretty well summed up the feelings of the Navy helicopter crew from the carrier USS Tripoli and other staff volunteer workers, after completing a disaster relief flight, which ferried food supplies to five barrios (districts) in the flooded area.

Captain Hal B. Stewart, chief of staff to Rear Admiral John H. Dick, ComUSNavPhil, organized the collection of the relief supplies and requested transportation from the Tripoli to fly the materials to the isolated barrios that previous relief flights hadn't reached.

The Tripoli, already very actively engaged in the disaster relief operations, quickly responded. The CH-46 helo was piloted by Lieutenant Commander E. R. Miller and co-piloted by Commander S. A. Coakley. Crewmembers Petty Officer Second Class S. J. Freeman and Petty Officer Third Class W. C. Thompson acted as loadmasters and helped distribute the supplies.


The much needed supplies, consisting of rice, breakfast cereals, baby foods, nutribuns, instant breakfast, and soap, totalling nearly two tons, were solicited by Walsh, Petty Officer First Class Gene Miller and Seaman Douglas Soden.

### AGRICULTURE IN ACTION

While the Secretary of Agriculture is proudly proclaiming that American farm exports have reached a new record high in the past year, the Administration announced action to restrict the export of U. S. cattle hides.

The recent action of restricting exports of cattle hides will seriously reduce farmers' income opportunities and is not in accord with the nation's efforts to increase exports, according to William J. Kuhfus, president of the American Farm Bureau Federation, the nation's largest farm organization.

The intention of the government in restricting hide exports is to force down the price of hides available to domestic tanners and shoe manufacturers. Such action is not expected to have much impact on the retail price of shoes since hide price is an exceedingly small factor in the overall cost of a pair of shoes.

The importance of farm exports to the nation's balance of payments is seen in the fact that an increase in our farm exports for the fiscal year ended June 30 partially offset a large U.S. trade deficit in non-farm products.

Farm exports for the fiscal year were \$2 billion larger than agricultural imports. This favorable farm trade balance is the highest in five years. The accomplishment in farm trade held the nation's overall balance of trade to a \$5.1 billion deficit, the largest in history.

Government officials have also expressed concern over beef prices and have rightly pointed out that one reason for higher meat prices is rising consumer demand. The best way to satisfy demand is to increase production. But how do export controls on hides encourage farmers to produce more cattle?

While export controls have been initiated in an effort to reduce shoe prices, it is farmers' income opportunity which will decline, not shoe prices.

### NO PEACH CROP -- WHY??

There is no peach crop in southeastern Michigan this year, and an extremely small crop in western Michigan. Don Johnson, Washtenaw County Extension Director, states the crop was lost in January. Normally fruiting buds of peach and apricot trees can tolerate sub-zero temperatures if the temperatures change gradually and don't persist too long. The weather condition that destroyed the fruit buds happened on January 15 and 16, when temperatures plummeted from 30 to 40 degrees above 0 the week prior to 15 to 20 degrees below 0.

Fruiting buds are the most tender part of a tree while leaf buds are much more hardy and may not show the effects of the winter kill. Trees normally produce a vast number of fruiting buds, so many that if 10% of the buds produce a peach, a grower would consider this a full crop.

Another weather condition which might have been a contributing factor to no peach crop was the unusually dry summer and fall of 1971. There was an unusually high winter kill of many species of trees and shrubs and horticulturalists believe trees and shrubs went into the winter in an abnormal stress condition caused by the drought.





### Weave a Lattice Over Luscious Peaches

Summer's juiciest sun ripened peaches are too lovely to be hidden under even the best of upper crusts. The golden slices seem meant to show off between the openings of woven lattice. Don't let the peach season pass without making Fresh Peach Lattice Pie at least once.

#### Fresh Peach Lattice Pie

- 1 recipe double crust pastry
- 1/4 to 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 to 2 tablespoons corn starch
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 5 cups pitted, sliced ripe peaches
- 1 teaspoon lemon juice
- 1 tablespoon margarine

Mix together sugar, corn starch and salt; sprinkle over peaches. Add lemon juice and toss together until well coated. Line a 9-inch pie pan with one half of pastry allowing 1 inch overhang. Fill shell with peach mixture and dot with margarine. Roll remaining pastry into 12-inch circle. Cut into 10 (1/2-inch) strips with pastry wheel or knife. Place 5 of the strips across filling. Weave lattice crust with remaining strips by folding back alternate strips as each cross strip is added. Fold trimmed edge of lower crust over ends of strips; seal and flute. Bake in a 425° F. (hot) oven 30 to 35 minutes or until browned.





# NOTICE of Rate Hearing and Notice of Hearing on Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief

On August 2, 1972, Consumers Power Company filed an Application with the Michigan Public Service Commission which, as amended on August 9, 1972, requests authority to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by approximately \$56,000,000 on an annual basis and, at the same time, Consumers Power Company filed a Motion for Partial and Immediate Rate Relief which as amended on August 9, 1972, seeks authority, on an interim basis, to amend its retail electric rates so as to increase its retail electric revenues by approximately \$34,167,000 on an annual basis. 



## Methodist Church Sold




