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
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

Leaving this week, after a 3 1/2 week visit, are Polly and Thomas Price, mother and father of Maria Lehr. Maria's brother Robert and his wife Curly formed the most delightful quartet of visitors to visit Manchester in a long

Not even a fire which destroyed four bedrooms and all of their possesssions, including their clothes, jewelry and luggage, could dim the pleasure of the family reunion.

Thomas, who works in the office on the docks at the fishing port of forcamb and lives in the town of Fleetwood, in Lancashire County, and Maria's mother Polly, who works at a hospital, were both so happy to have a good long visit with daughter and sonin-law Glenn Lehr and to become reacquainted with the grandchildren.

The house at Sanborn road was the happiest in town till the fire struck. Fortunately papers and passports came through damp but legible.

Maria's brother Robert is truly a "bobby" for he is a policeman in the town of Bury, near Manchester, England His present duty is that of executing Warrants, or plainly speaking, to arrest cople, so he spends most of his working hours driving the 'paddy wagon' which is a useful tool of his profession. One tool not considered useful is a gun, which is not used, or even carried, at least almost never. Perhaps, he says, if a lunatic or murderer were loose in the town one might consider carrying a weapon but this is extremely rare. In Bury, a mill town of 70,000 people they will have perhaps one murder a year. The crime most in evidence seems to be a break-in - or running a close second, assaults, that being a polite term for those disagreements which arise after too much drinking. He becomes serious when queried about the drug problem and says they are not free of it and it seems to be spreading, but also says its a world wide problem, that all countries seem to be reporting the rise. Curly, Robert's young wife is a bouncy, bright young thing, who sparkles and impishly says she never really thought a visit to the U.S. was a good idea, but that after one gets here and sees the country and meets the really great people, then she could stay forever. Really it's surprising, she says, to find the wonderful sense of humor in the American people, not stuffy but fun and friendly. This naturally led to a discussion of the similarities and differences of our habits, customs, and ways of looking at things.

Father Thomas, states that one outstanding trait he notices is the en-

tire freedom of everyone here to be friendly with everyone else, and wealthy people and working people and professional people all are willing to know each other and be friends. Class distinction. by their definition, seems not to exist here, but, he adds, in England, the older families, the titled people, can always be counted upon to treat everyone with respect.

Carlic and such like are not used - plain good food, but one mus be careful about ordering in a restaurant. French fries here are chips there and potato chips here are crisps there.

#### "Ike" Walton Retires

It has been a long time between is boyhood on a northwestern Wisconsin farm and this 25th Anniversary year as General Manager of the Michigan Livestock Exchange and you would think that R. H. "Ike" Walton would be looking forward to enjoying the relaxation that comes with retirement. Such

is not the case. Even though "Ike" officially turns ver the reins of the \$80,000,000 per year livestock cooperative operation to Harold Lein of St. Louis, Michigan, on September 1, 1972, he will continue on as a consultant to the firm he has served so notably during the past quarter

When "Ike" took over at Michigan ivestock Exchange 25 years ago, the cooperative was doing an annual busines of \$7,5000,000. He realized early in the going that marketing trends were changing, however, and decentralization was in the offing. The Detroit market could not remain the sole operation of the Exchange.

Changes were made in the ensuing years with the decentralization taking the form of locations comprising about 100 miles in diameter and through "Ike's" tenure branches were established at Battle Creek, St. Louis, Cassopolis, Cass City, and Manchester, Michigan's nost modern marketing facility. The Exchange's business increased ten-fold through the years with the end certainly

net yet in sight. The still-energetic Mr. Walton vas raised on that northwestern Wisconsin farm mentioned above and went to River Falls Teachers College in the Badger State, graduating in 1927. His post college career took him through the principalships of grade and high schools at Cochran, Wisconsin and then on into the Vocational Agriculture

field in Wisconsin education. Leaving the teaching field in 1936 and through 1947, "Ike" was the manager of the Green Bay branch of Equity Livestock Cooperative Sales, from which position he came to Detroit and the Michigan Livestock Exchange

In his lifetime, Mr. Walton has assisted either directly or through leadership many young men in livestock careers. One of those men, Harold Lein, manager of the St. Louis Branch

for the past several years, now takes over as the chief of operations with the Michigan Livestock Exchange, now home based in the new facilities just finished this spring at Manchester.

Mr. Lein epitomizes the strength, ledication and desire instilled in those with whom "Ike" Walton has come in contact through the years. The ship is certain to sail a straight course.




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# COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

2½ cups sifted all-purpose flour 2½ teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoon salt

Blanch nectarines, remove peel. Mash enough fruit to measure I cup. Cream shortening with sugar; mix in eggs and vanilla. Sift flour with baking powder and salt; add to creamed mixture alternately with mashed nectarines, mixing well after each addition. Mix in nuts. Turn into greased and floured 9x5x3-inch in pan 10 minutes; remove and finish cooling on rack. Wrap and store overnight for best slicing. Makes 1 loaf.
