Seventy six men and women recorded from this area have given a gallon (8 units) of blood or more to the Manchester Red Cross Blood Club in the past twenty years. Ten of this number have given two, and four have given three gallons!

The community owes these people, as well as all who have given their blood that their neighbors may be safe in time of need, a debt of gratitude. But better yet, if you are capable of being a blood donor, isn't it time that you did your share? One never expects to need blood, but over 150 pints were used by our area in 1971 without any exceptionally outstanding cases.

True, not everyone can give blood and the Red Cross is especially careful about the donor as well as the recipient. If one is deferred at a clinic the Red Cross will tell him why and his prospects of giving at another time. This care is reflected in the esteem with which hospitals and the American Medical Society view volunteer blood.
