



I am writing in regards to the antibortion letter published in the October 2th issue of the Enterprise. There are number of points in this letter that I lisagree with, and I wish to express my

new, which is that of a pro-abortionist. First, I want to set the vocabulary traight. We are discussing embryos or fetuses, not babies. From the moment of conception until 2 months this group of cells is called an embryo, and from months until birth it is called a fetus. It is not called a baby until the moment of birth, and for the topic under discussion it is misleading and incorrect to

In your letter you say that "until elatively recently, all human life has been jealously guarded by both law and tradition." May I remind you again that we are not discussing human life, but otential human life. A human fetus has the capability of developing into human life, just as the male's sperm and the female's unfertilized egg have the capability for developing into human life However, the embryo or fetus is not human life, and true human life is guarded just as much now as it ever was.

The population explosion has not made life less precious as you suggest, it has brought about an awareness which has made it more precious. People are starting to realize how overpopulation is affecting the environment. More people means more pollution, more poverty, and, because more people will take up more space in which to live, there will be less land to use for the purpose of feeding the people. In general, there will be a lowering of the quality of life. Obviously, legalizing abortion will not solve the population explosion by itself, but it is an important step to not force women who don't want to have a baby have it anyway.

You say abortion is not a complete simple solution because of possible complications and because "the experence leaves emotional if not physical scars upon the women for the remainder of her life." Of course complications and physical scars are possible with abortion, but complications and physical scars are possible with any surgical opera tion. In fact, statistics show that more women die, percentage-wise from child birth than from abortion. As for the motional scars, a large majority of them are more than likely caused by people like yourselves who wrongly accuse wome of murder merely because they chose not o be forced into having a baby. Furthermore. what patient would want a healthy orgaremoved? However, does any healthy organ have the potential economic, social, and phychological consequences of an embryo or fetus?

As far as your arguement that where bortion has been legalized, there has been little decrease in the number of criminal abortions, I doubt very much the validity of this statement.

You suggest agencies such as Proble-Pregnancy Help which can be of assistance to the women who want to have their baby totally agree with the aims of these organizations, as they can be a big help to these women. However, we are not dis cussing women who want to have their babies. Abortion is not a factor for these women to consider. What we are discussing are women who do not want to have a baby, but, who, as far as the laws of this state are concerned, are forced to have

Let's stop using innocent babies as etribution to punish unmarried mothers. It is true that some illegitimate children will eventually find happiness and acceptance in adoptive homes, but many others do not. A deeper tragedy is the uncounted numbers of unwanted children who are born into unhappy homes and children who are born to parents who beat and abuse

You state in your letter, "It is widely aught the freedom of one individual ends when it begins to infringe upon the rights of another." I agree with you - let's ston infringing upon the rights of the pregnant roman who doesn't want to be pregnant. Vote yes on proposal B on November 7th.

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
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ANN ARBOR - There will be a night court for domestic relations cases, stated circuit judge candidate Shirley
Burgoyne on Thursday evening (Oct. 12) in a debate with other circuit court can-

There are too many people who have to take off a whole day from work to appear in court for five minutes", she said, "and they wait around all day for their case to come up. Since 40% of all circuit cases are divorce, it would he better to give people the chance to appear in court at night."

Burgoyne discussed issues central to the Washtenaw County circuit court udge race during a debate sponsored by the Pharmacy Auxiliary. Burgoyne outlined a long series of reforms she intends to make if elected to the bench in November. She stressed the importance of an assignment clerk to adjust the case load between the judges, the considera-tion of the rights of children in divorce cases, and a revision of the sometimes tedius and superficial instructions to the jurors in criminal cases.

"In the field of criminal defense-and I have handled all cases from murder and forcible rape to the smallest misdemeanors" -- Burgoyne said, "the important thing is the communication which must go on in the courtroom. There is a way to sit on the bench and impart by the tone of your voice, a sincerity and honesty that will come through to the persons standing in front

Burgoyne asserted the fact that her pponents, although already judges, only had experience with the district court which is essentially a traffic and misdemeanor court. She stated that of the four candidates, she was the only one who had been practicing for many years in criminal defense and divorce

Burgoyne contended that too often defendants leave the court with more bitterness against 'the law' than when they come in because of the way their cases were handled. "I do not want a political court," she said. "As a Judge, will use the power of the office for the good of all of us. neither for personal gain nor for any one group."



It is one of the "classaction" suits that we're seeing a lot of in recent years. It means that the suit was filed on behalf of all bread buyers in the New York area. A further indictment by a federal grand jury charges that the companies conspired to fix prices, adding five cents to each loaf of bread sold from 1966 to 1969. An estimated 750 million loaves of bread were sold during that time in the area, for an alleged overcharge totalling almost four million dollars.

This suit comes at a bad time for the bakers. They are already under

suspicion by the public because of recent statements that the price of bread should go up. The American Bakers Association as been seeking an increase of from two to three cents per loaf, claiming that higher prices are necessary because recent large grain sales to foreign countries have driven up farm wheat prices.

Farmers know that such claims are false, and say that it is nonsense to blame current wheat prices and farmers for an ncrease in bread costs.

One farm leader said, "According to the best we can determine, it takes an increase of about 40 cents per bushel in the price of wheat to raise the farmer's share of a loaf of bread by a half-penny. These figures have since been confirmed by USDA, which adds that remaining wheat stocks still in storage are so substantial that they not only will easily meet all needs, but there will be an equate carryover for next year.

The biggest mystery of all to farme s this: Twinty years ago, wheat was selling for \$2,12 a bushel, and the average now is only \$1.70 per bushel. And while the price of wheat has dropped 42 cents a bushel, the price of a loaf of bread has doubled in that 20 years. It makes farmers a little aggravated to hear the baking industry say that the price of wheat to the farmer has caused bread prices to go up.

A growing trend among states is the consideration of legislation requiring motorists to wear safety beits. Safety experts are desperate to find a means of cutting down the annual highway death toll which will reach

The logic for such laws is clear. Both tests and practical experience prove every day that seat belts save lives and prevent crippling injuries.

The alternative of trying to persuade people to wear belts just hasn't worked. Madison Avenue may sell iceboxes to Eskimos, but so far they haven't sold seat belts to motorists.

Another alternative is a federal government regulation which will put air bags in new cars beginning in 1975. Their reliability is in question and the White House says it will add \$300 to the cost of each car.





NOAA (pronounced Noah) offers young persons a career in marine research and development, along with programs in atmospheric and environmental research. For additional information I suggest you write directly to the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, U.S. Department of Commerce, Rockville, Maryland 20852.
