Shorter days -- not colder weather ause leaves to change color and drop the trees each fall; explains Dr.

Melvin R. Koelling, MSU forester. "The beautiful autumn leaf colors re caused by pigments, the chemical ubstances found in most living things, says Koelling.

Most of the pigments responsible for the bright fall colors are present in the leaf from its formation. During the spring and summer, however, the colors are masked by chlorophyll, the dominate green pigment. Chlorophyll is formed by exposure to light, or the process of photo-

In the shorter fall days photosynthesis ceases and production of new chlorophyll in the leaves diminishes while the breakdown of old chlorophyll continues. Soon all the chlorophyll is gone and the other pigments emerge as the characteristic fall olors, says Koelling.

Weather does have some effect on leaf color. Cool nights and warm days favor the production of colorful scarlets, in fall, and plants come up again in spring. lavenders, and purples. Freezing temperature

HURON VALLEY GIRL SCOUT COUNCIL

Did you ever wonder what the Man-chester United Fund contribution to Girl Scouts pays for? Or why an organization needs funds with so many people volumteering their time?





TIPS ON DRIVING OUR **EXPRESSWAYS**

Our vast Interstate highway system nearing completion. In fact, you can already drive virtually border-to-border without traveling a two-lane road; a far cry from just a decade ago when superhighway-building got underway in earnest.

While safe-driving rules apply on any roadway, the following tips are designed especially to help you drive our expressways safely.

TO ENTER AND EXIT: When entering an expressway, remember — those cars are traveling at far higher speeds than on local view mirrors, accelerate quickly, and blend into traffic. To exit, know when your turnoff is coming up, signal, check mirrors (and blind-spot), move to your lane, and slow

you're going to miss your exit, drive on to the next one. Abruptly stopping or swerving o change lanes could cause a tragic accident above all, don't try to pull off the pavement and back up to your exit: it's illegal and onto the shoulder and stop. Should you need help, tie a handkerchief to your door handle or radio antenna and raise the hood. At night, use flashers and/or interior lights

SIGNALING, PASSING, TAILGATING: On expressways, stay in one lane as much as possible. If you do change lanes to pass, eck mirrors, signal, accelerate and move in to your new position with plenty of time o spare. Tailgating is always dangerous, but extremely so on expressways. So keep a Rule of thumb: one car length for every ten





By C. Chapin After two weeks on the road, a 24 hour stop was the entire time allowed by two Alaskan visitors to Manchester this week. Enroute to Florida, the sister and brother in law of Bob Chapin, of Main St., Laura and Reggie Hendricks, could only stop for enough time to catch up on family news, meet the children, take a look at the town and move on. Leaving behind them glimpses of an exciting life of challenges met and wilderness explored. Reggie and Laura, properly of Clam Gulch, Alaska, went first to Alaska in 1957 for a visit and stayed 2 years, he

working in Civil Service and she as Engineer and Film Editor at Television Station KENI-TV in Anchorage. Develop ing and broadcasting her own shows, she had the thrill of being on the switchboard when the news of Alaska's statehood was announced.

In 1959 they moved from Anchorage to the Kenai Peninsula, 180 miles South West, to a Homestead of 160 Acres. Homesteading has its own regulations, and they lived seven months of each year on the property, built a cabin, built a road, cleared 20 acres and planted Study of Migrant and Indian Education, what is known as a Homesteaders Mix, a combination of Timothy, Rye, and Barley, the only rule being that it must be other than native grass.

The great agricultural area is in another part of the country, called the Matanuska Vailey, nearer Anchorage, and here are grown root vegetables, cabbages 30 to 60 pounds, and in these more recent years are growing peas, lettuce, corn under plastic as mulch and potatoes so fine that they are exported to the States for Seed Stock. Hot House Conditions also produce 10 ft. high tomato plants, cucumbers and zuchinni.

However, on the Kenai Peninsula, the Homestead is adjacent to and surrounded by the Kenai Moose Range, about 370 square miles, or roughly 1/3 of the Penninsula sit aside, where the world's biggest moose live. The Range is open to hunters during season, and the 7 foot high moose, weighing up to two thousand pounds, is quite a freezer full of meat. The Range also abounds in wolves, coyotes, lynx, black and brown bear, goat and sheep, really a hunters

During these years, beginning in 1960, Reg and Laura, "went outside" during the winter months and back to Alaska in the summer. The years were packed full of places to go and things to do, things like Salmon fishing, with a gill netter, or 'drift' boat, and going back to the University at Central Wash-

ington State College to take a B.A. in Biology, then later to receive her Masters in Education with Audio Visual Specialization, and all this time Reggie who is a fine Photographer is building their library of Alaskan Photography. Doubleday contracts with this couple to produce an Audio-Visual Educational Kit on Alaska, including records, film strips and realia. This naturally led to other film strips such as Mt. McKinley National Park and the Everglades in

Laura's first teaching assignment was at a small fishing village in Ninilchik, an ancient Russian village on the Kenai Peninsula (the Russians occupied this territory remember) and she was the entire elementary school staff. Seventh and eighth grade, 17 native students and she taught them everything, Science, Math, Civics, Social Studies, Literature English, Health and Physical Ed. too! Her second try was in St. Petersburg,

Florida where she had 250 students per day for only a science course. A real contrast from pioneer to urban life. Joining the faculty at Central Washington (the state of Washington) they worked together at the Center for the

conducting workshops for the educators. In 1971 they joined Vista, and were sent back to Alaska, from Florida on a project named ALL (Adult Literary Lab) to develop educational materials for non-English Speaking Adult Native Peoples, and then became part of the faculty at the University of Alaska Com-

munity College. A film strip of Hawaii is in progress and a trip to the Virgin Islands for another is projected for January.

Busy people, creative and interested in the changing world, they record what they see and pass it on to all of us who stay at home. Working for the improvement of the natives in Alaska and teaching wherever they are, they always make at least a one day stop in Manchester, usually about every 2 years. A lovely town, peaceful and friendly, they have been welcomed and made to feel at home.


