

"HIGHWAY or STREET" Means the entire width between the boundary lines of every way publicly maintained when any part thereof is open to the use of the rublic for purposes of vehicular travel.







By cutting through red tape, members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. Griffin, Senate Office Building, Washington, D.C. 20510.

I'm interested in buying some land out west as an investment, and I know the government owns quite a lot of it. Does the Federal government sell any of the land it owns; and, if so, how can I find out what's available?

The Bureau of Land Management's quarterly magazine, "Our Public Lands," contains a listing of upcoming sales of Federally-owned lands, along with information on how to bid on tracts. The recent Fall issue, which I'm enclosing, lists land that is available for sale in Colorado, Idaho, Oregon, New Mexico and Arizona. Copies may be obtained by writing to the Bureau of Land Management, Department of the Interior, Washington, D.C. 20240.

I understand that people who buy things from door-to-door salesmen now have a chance to think it over and, if they decide they don't want what they bought, they can return it. Is this true?

-T. E., Cadillac

Yes. Michigan passed a law last year that allows consumers a three business day "cooling-off period" to determine whether they wish to keep purchases made from doorto-door salesmen. The law applies to sales of \$35 or more. The salesman must inform the buyer of his or her right to cancel. Cancellation may be made by regular mail, and there can be no penalty for cancelling an order.

- 1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/4 cup corn starch ½ teaspoon salt
- 1½ cups water
- 1 cup milk 3 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup margarine
- 1 teaspoon vanilla 6 tablespoons sugar

Mix together brown sugar corn starch and salt in 2quart saucepan. Gradually stir in water, then milk, Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring constantly and boil for one minute.

Beat egg yolks slightly and stir a little hot mixture into yolks. Then stir all into remaining hot mixture. Return to boil, stirring constantly and boil 1 minute.

Remove from heat and stir in margarine and vanilla. Cool to room temperature and turn filling into pie shell.

Make a meringue from egg whites and the 6 tablespoons sugar. Spread some meringue around edge touching crust all around. Then fill in center. Bake in a 350° F. (moderate) oven 15 to 20 minutes until meringue is lighty browned. Cool away from drafts.
