

Miss White (Mrs. Ziegler) and her class had arithmetic problems worked on the blackboard.


With each child having made a horn book, lessons written on them were recited out loud. Aesop's Fables were read and discussed with special



As everyone knows there are laws governing everything we do. I think we agree, lawbreakers should be

We are snowmobile owners. It has come to our attention there are many complaints concerning snowmobiles and their activities on the streets and sur-

ordinances governing the use of snowmobiles in any given area, whether it be Manchester or Sault St. Marie. If you are a private property owner in viznehester or where ever, you can report mow mobile lawbroakers just as vou would a car accident, fire, burgulary, or anything else you would feel was dangerous to life, limb, or prop-

Machine with 3-4inch high numbers. Clearly visable, numbers must be on both sides of the front of snowmobiles. If you see or witness a snowmobile lawbreaker, they can be report-

Some of the highlights of Man-

chester's city ordinance are: No one can ride a snowmobile on Main Street from Huber's Gulf Station down to the corner of M-52 and Main at anytime.

2. All snowmobiles must be off the streets of Manchester at 11 p.m. 3. When riding snowmobiles in Manchester city limits they must comply with any and all traffic laws that any car or other motorized vehicle must obey. Such as speed, stop signs, reck-

drunkedness, excessive noise etc. . Snowmobile operators must be licensed drivers, unless they are on pri-

. Another important law anywhere is NO LITTERING.

If you feel a snowmobiler is tresspassing on your property, being reckless, take the number of machine and the make of the machine if you are sure what it is) and then report them. They are lawbreakers too and can be ticketed just as an automobile driver, motorcycle rider, or even boats on a lake.

BUT be fair. Don't judge all snowmobilers because of one or two that are lawbreakers.

Some people have a tendency to be prejudiced against all of a group of people or certain sport because they have seen a few bad examples.

Some offenders (snowmobilers. numters etc.) do things they are not supposed to because they are not aware

Such as tresspassing, riding a mobile or hunting, sometimes its very easy to wander on to private property unwittingly. Don't be unfair to all because of a few.

This thought can be applied to almost anything in our lives. Have you ever driven your car

in a strange city, and disobeved a law maybe because the signs are in different places then where you are used to

Do you condemn all teenagers because a few use drugs, have long hair, or in some instances uncontroll-

Do you condeinn a specific religion, creed or race, because you had a bad experience with a few? Think about it!

I'm not making excuses for any snowmobiler. If he does something wrong, then the due process of law should take its course.

Snowmobiling is a family sport, just like boating, camping, fishing, and many, many others that are not mentioned. If a snowmobiler wants to race or trail ride there are planned activities and places for them.

There have been a few incidents nappen that to me, as a snowmobiler, maybe I could dispise all people, (because of 1 or 2) such as purposely stringing a wire between two close trees, or I could mention another where a driver of a truck backed into 3 snowmobiles because he told the police officers he had one tresspass across his yard. I could mention many other discriminatory things against non-snowmobilers, but that wouldn't be fair either. Right

All of this could apply to people driving cars, motorcycles, and trucks. I feel the whole key to this is everyone understanding the laws and city ordinances. 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

Junked cars are just one of the eyesores on our landscape But they don't have to be a blight much longer.



AGRICULTURE IN ACTION TIME TO ACT

> Property tax has continued to spiral upward for some time. Continued voter rejection of proposals throughout the state clearly mandates the need for property tax reform and new approaches to school finance.

In many parts of the nation, major changes are in process to finance schools. In some states, the courts are now ruling that more equitable means must be found for financing. Some school districts receive as low as \$5 for every mill levied and, in other districts as high as \$80 for every mill levied.

The Michigan Supreme Court presently has under consideration the constitutionality of using property tax to finance school operation. It is expected that the Michigan Court will rule, as courts in other states have. that this type of property tax is unconstitutional.

From all indications, we will have tax reform one way or another. It is now obvious that the people must and can exercise their inherent power and amend the Michigan Constitution by placing the issue on the

ballot, by the petition route, and then casting their vote at election time. At the present time, a tax reform petition drive sponsored by Governor Milliken is underway to place the

issue before the people. The Democratic Party has also announced a petition drive to place the issue before the people.

The two petitions will be very similar as far as property tax is concerned. The total limit for property tax will be cut from the present constitutional limit of 50 mills to 26 mills. Reform will also come from eliminating the property tax for school operation. which averages 26 mills in the state. The major difference between the two petition programs is that the Democra-

tic petition will contain provisions requiring that a graduated income tax be adopted in Michigan.

Each and every registered voter should sign the petitions to insure the issue's placement on the ballot so Michigan citizens can solve the problem. It may be the last opportunity for any meaningful tax reform.

/2 - 1/8 teaspoon salt 4 cup milk

Grease, waxed-paper line. then grease and flour two 9-inch square baking pans. Beat the butter until soft. Gradually add sugar and beat until fluffy. Beat in the egg yolks, vanilla and nutmeats. Combine the crushed cookies, baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add to creamed mixture alternately with milk. Whip egg whites and 1/8 teaspoon salt until stiff; fold into crumbcreamed mixture. Pour batter into prepared pans. Bake in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) about 1/2 hour. Remove from pans; cool on wire rack. Place raspberry jam and whipped cream or custard filling between layers. This cake can also be iced with caramel icing. Makes one -inch layer cake.

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




