

guarantee that you will be satisfied Home gardeners usually have access to three sources of rose plants -- local nurseries, mail order houses, and supermarkets and department stores.

"Local nurseries and garden centers are generally good sources of planting material, " says Carlson. "Drug stores, supermarkets and de-

partment stores are good sources if their stock has been kept dormant and protected from drying .


"The best selection of high-quality plants is usually available from mail order nurseries," says Carlson. Reputable mail order companies also furnish catalogs and will guarantee their plants to grow and bloom if given nor-

If you don't know what rose variety you want to buy, mail order catalogs can be a big help. The varieties listed are favorites with rose growers and you are likely to be satisfied with any

Carlson recommends contacting local garden clubs and rose societies for specific information on varieties that do well in your local area.

CANCELS SUBSCRIPTION

"Recently we learned of an editor of a small-town newspaper who found himself short of material with which to fill the columns, so he had his composer set up the Ten Commandments, which were printed without editorial comment. After the newspaper was published the editor received a letter, as follows: "Cancel my subscription: you're getting personal'.....some people just always seem to have a guilty conscience.



"Increase In Army Pay"

The pay of a buck private hit the 100-a-week mark on January 1, announced ergeant Dallas Landrem, the local Army recruiter in Ann Arbor.

The figure reflects the military's third salary increase in 12 months, and repsents an across-the-board 5.5 percent hike to cover increases in the cost of living Seven weeks ago - the day the wage freeze ended - Congress boosted the pay f servicemen. Those boosts, weighted in favor of the lower ranking officers and enlisted men, were designed to attract enough volunteers so that it would not be necessary to renew the President's draft authority when it expires on June 30, 1973.

"The pay raise is the 10th in eight years," said Sergeant Landrem. And it has really changed the complexion of the military." For example: "30 months ago the basic pay of the new recruit was \$120,00 a month. On January 1 it became

The basic pay does not really give a true picture of the military salary expounded the sergeant. Servicemen also receive additional housing and subsistence allowances which are nontaxable. This means that an average new recruit now receives \$5,140.00 a year, \$2,000.00 more than received two months and two

For the highest ranking sergeant, a sergeant major, average pay now stands at \$15, 184 a year, up more than \$1,700 over the two months. "Of course these are just average pay scales," said the sergeant. "The actual

pay varies with the number of years in service as well as rank." Sergeant Landrem concluded by stating, that in addition to the pay scales mentioned, there are 128 other benefits and allowances for which servicemen may be eligible. 

To cut through red tape members of Congress can often lend a hand to those with problems involving the federal government. Through the columns of this newspaper, Senator Griffin answers questions of general interest. He will respond personally to all communications addressed to: Senator Robert P. After serving in Vietnam with the Marines, I'm honorably discharged and attending Wayne State University. I've been going to college for nearly four months now but have received no GI benefits from the Veterans Administration. ministration. I have called, inquired, pleaded, but to no avail—still no check. I have a wife and child to support. Can you do anything?

The processing required under existing law finally has been completed, and the VA advises that your check is on its way. I have a bill in Congress (5.2063) which would authorize the VA to make advance GI bill payments to a veteran during the processing period, once he has been enrolled in college. Delays such as you have encountered are intolerable and actually discourage some veterans with dependents from continuing their education. My bill is pending before the Senate Committee on Veterans' Affairs.

More than 300 feet of Lake Michigan shoreline has eroded in front of my house in the past 10 years, and according to the National Ocean Survey a good deal more will go if the lake rises another 8 inches—as they predict. The Army Corps of Engineers says it can work to prevent erosion of public property, but there is little they can do in the case of private property. Something must be done before this becomes a dispater area and my be done before this becomes a disaster area and my house falls in the lake.



Michigan Livestock Exchange Open House Sunday, April 23

The newest facility of the Michigan Livestock Exchange will hold Open House on Sunday, April 23, from 2:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m. Located on M-52, two miles north of Manchester, the general offices of the Exchange are also located in this facility.

Welcoming the public will be Mr. John (Jack) Pascoe, director of this facility, and long known to many in the area as a cattle salesman out of the Detroit Stockyard. Jack and his wife, lean, parents of one son and two daughters, have purchased property in this area and will be building a home here. A graduate of Pennsylvania State University in 1939 with a degree in Animal Husbandry, he worked with Armour and Company in Chicago and spent several years in Utah, Wyoming and California before joining the Michigan Exchange

Mrs. Jane Clark, who with husband Ken and three children, lives at Pleasant Lake will be in charge of the office as a full time employee.

Harold Render of Tipton will be in charge of the Sheep Department and Mike Bigelow of Hogs. Mike is a native of Flushing, Michigan and received a B.S. degree in Animal Husbandry

from Michigan State University in 1967. Living in the Village of Manchester, Mike previously spent 4 years with the Mayer Meat Company.

Most interesting to the visitor will be the Arena within the main barn where the stock is actually auctioned. Standing in the gallery looking down at the floor of the Arena, the entire floor be-comes a scale, with the delicate mechanism registering as little as 5 lbs. and as much as 30,000 lbs. The weight is instantaneously recorded in lights above the auctioneers booth to be seen by the entire audience.

The ticket for each sale is automatically stamped by the scale in pounds and immediately sent by express tube to the office. A telephone sits in the Arena so that the Exchange representative is available at all times even during a sale.

Outside the booth, but still within the Main barn is a large black old-fashioned dinner bell, reminiscent of the farm. When the Auctioneer pulls the rope, the buyers are signalled the sale is about to start. The first auction will take place at 10:00 a.m. May 1st.
