





The Manchester Public Schools will open Tuesday, September 5, 1972 for the 1972-73 school year. Students will attend school a full day on that date. Bus routes will continue on last year's schedule for the first week, and any changes that are necessary will be made for the second week.

Anyone in the school district having a kindergarten student who has not been registered should do this immediately. Parents may register their children at either the Klager Elementary School or at the Superintendent's Office between the hours of 8:00 A.M. and 3:30 P.M.

New residents in the school district may register their children at anytime during the above stated hours.

School officials are looking for an increase in enrollment based on the reported number of new families moving into the school district.

An unprecidented increase occurred during the 1971-72 school year when 36 additional students were enrolled during that time. The total enrollment as of May 28, 1972 stood at 1340 with 1304 in attendance on the fourth Friday in September of 1971.

It is evident from the number of new homes being built in the district that the Manchester School System can expect considerable growth in the next


The Manchester Co-op Nursery Salas Potluck Supper will be held September 11th at 7:00 p.m. at the manuel Church.

Our officials, headed by Mike Rossettie and Jerry Jacob, were Pete Hughs on the left boundry, Lee Dennis hooking chains, and Jim Mann pulling the bolt back. these hard workers. The lightweights turned out to be a real contest between 2 young men, Ken Diuble, Saline, and Dan Eaton, Tecumseh. Each seemed to be determined to be top man, and they pulled all the way up to 1730 pounds, before Dan Eaton found his limit. They were pulling close to twice their own weight. Taking 3rd was Gary Schwab of Manchester, and 4th was Jon Schenk of Grass Lake. Jon, weighing only 500 pounds, was called out because of jerking the chain, but he said he'd add some weights, and see us next year. This is typical of the sporting attitude of all these men, who are really a pleasure

to work with. The mediumweight class also turned into a 2 man duel, after Gerold Eaton went out at 1830 pounds for 4th place, and Gary Traster was scopped at 1880 pounds. Willard Girbach and Brian Leisinger went on pulling pretty evenly until at 2330 pounds, when Leisinger had the misfortune of breaking his gearbox. These men were both pulling over twice their weight.

The heavyweight contestants all weighed within 10 pounds of each other, ranging from 1290 to 1300 pounds. All went evenly for the first 9 pulls, and we started adding 100 pounds at a time.

1972 RURAL ENVIRONMENTAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

Cost-sharing payments are now being made to farmers for carrying out soil, water, woodland, wildlife and polition abatement practices under the Rural Environmental Assistance Program, according to Raymond Cirbach, Chairmen of the Washtenaw County ASC Committee. This Federal program has been in effect since 1936 following the great dust storms of the 1930's. Many of these practices have eliminated the run-off of million of tens of top soil, greatly reducing the pollution of the nation's waterways. Cholesterol faddists who have been trying to scare people into switch. ing from animal fats to vegetable oil or eat fewer eggs may be doing a dis service to some parts of our population Literally hundreds of millions of

dollars have been spent on research attempting to prove that foods high in natural cholesterol and food containing saturated fats are an important contributing factor in the incidence of coronary heart disease in man. No such proof has been forthcoming.

In a research project conducted by Dr. Raymond Reiser of Texas A. and M. University, low-cholesterol diets fed young experimental animals resulted in higher blood cholesterol levels later in their lives.

Dr. Reiser altered the diets of the mother rats so that milk nursed by their young had levels of cholesterol from 24 to 40 milligrams per 100 milliliters of milk, After 24 weeks, the rats nursed on high-cholesterol milk had serum levels of 150 milligrams. Those on low-cholesterol diets had a much higher serum level of 252.

Dr. Reiser theorizes that lack of dequate cholesterol in the diet of the oung animals caused the body organs of the newborn to make what it needed This resulted in a buildup of the enzymes which make cholesterol and a reduction in the enzymes which destroy or get rid

Also, many studies have been conducted but none of the research has indicated that eating eggs will increase serum cholesterol in the average person or that high levels of serum cholestero is correlated with high risk of heart disease in most people.

Certainly further research and investigation is needed. In the meantime, conclusive statements should not be made until there are sufficient facts to substantiate them.





With the start of most colleges only two weeks away, the Congress has taken action on a bill which I jointly introduced, to clear up the confusion surrounding one of the most popular forms of student aid. The guaranteed student loan program traditionally supplies more than \$1 billion per year to assist students through college. Privare banks, savings and loans, etc. loan the money to the students and delay collection of the loans until the student has graduated. The federal government guarantees the loans and in cases where there is financial need subsidizes the interest payments. This program has been the major source for bringing more private money into the education of our students.

When the Congress approved new higher education legislation earlier this summer, a clerical error resulted in the miscrafting of several key sentences in the student loan section of the bill. This error was not discovered until the bill had actually been signed into law. t resulted in new and extremely complicated regulations for receiving student loans -- including a requirement for very detailed financial information from the family of each student, great liscretion on the part of financial aid officers at each college (resulting in different rulings depending on the school hich you were attending), and serious estions on the part of banks as to what their obligations were. As a result any banks had stopped giving student cans. The confusion left doubt that many students would receive funds in time to attend the Fall Semester this

basis which would reinstate the old rules governing student loans until the Congress next year could straighten out the matter. This legislation assures that loans will be available for students this fall under the old provisions which assume that students with family incomes below \$15,000 are automatically in financial need and qualify for government subsidization. Students with familv incomes above \$15,000 are automatically disqualified for the special governmental subsidy, but may still be eligible for a guaranteed student rate at a discounted cost.

The limits on the total loans a student can take out will continue to remain the same. Undergraduates can borrow up to \$2500 for school per year but the entire amount for their loans cannot exceed \$7500. Graduate stude: can borrow up to \$10,000 for their graduate and undergraduate study.

Hopefully, Congress can work to reinstate the necessary changes in the loan program so that the reforms envisaged by the Higher Education Amend ments of 1972 can be realized.



For six months I was stationed on a ship off the coast of Vietnam, but three weeks ago I was suddenly called home because my mother had a stroke. Now that I'm here with 30 days emergency leave I find that my father just can't take care of my mother, my 6 younger brothers and sisters while holding down his job at the auto plant. And my mother is not getting better. My leave is running out, but I must help out at home. Can you do anything?

-S. T., Wyandotte

We contacted the Navy Department and urged consideration for your case. Your application for a "compassionate reassignment" has been approved, and now you'll be stationed near home for the remaining four months of your enlistment. This will enable you to be of some assistance to your father. I hope your mother fully recovers.

Now that I'm out of school, I'd like to spend some time overseas. I can't afford to go abroad as a tourist, so I would like to work in a foreign country if possible. Can you provide any tips on how to find a job overseas?

Yes. The Department of Labor has published a pamphlet entitled "Information about Jobs Overseas-Questions and Answers." You may obtain a copy free of charge by writing to the Manpower Administration, Department of Labor, 14th Street and Constitution Avenue, Washington, D.C. 20210. Wipe them with a household disin fectant and spread them on newspapers in a dry, dark place for three to four


