In the past few years, wireless auditory trainers using low powered FM transmitters have been experisystems. Unfortunately, the FCC rules governing wireless microphones place severe restrictions on manufac-turers, and have hurt development of these systems. Is there any way the FCC can be made to realize the possible importance of these systems to the deaf and

I've discussed this matter with the Federal Communication Commission (FCC) representatives, and they have assured me that new regulations will be forthcoming which will make provisions allowing manufacturers the latitude needed to develop successful systems for the deaf and hard of hearing children. Good luck in your work.
