Toys for Children

ation, can be taught cooperation and coordination. Watch the intensity of children at play, and you will see that they know what we have forgotten: play is not a matter to be gone into lightly.

Last year we published a list of Christmas toys for children from infancy to five years of age. Because children develop at different rates, we also listed the characteristics of each age group, and suggest-ed toys most suitable in each case. This year we are listing the play habits of the five through nine-year-olds, along with suggested gifts.

Fives need outdoor play in small groups. Tree climbing, swinging, roller skating, jumping rope, riding a tricycle are favorite activities. They enjoy the standard kindergarten materials, like to paint, draw, cut and paste. Blocks are still useful in construction projects: houses bridges, tunnels. Dolls that can be dressed or undressed are enjoyed by boys as

well as girls.

Fives like to be read to, preferably stories about animals who act human. They want their own phonograph records, and are attracted to combinations of words and music that tell a story, with lots of repetition that they can mimic.

Toys need not be expensive but must be sturdy. Crayons, clay, water colors and cutouts are fine for quieter moments; an old wallpaper sample book that can be cut up is a bonanza. Dolls and doll clothes are good for both sexes. If you're up tight about giving a boy a doll, you'll find there are costumed male dolls on the market.

Simple tools like carpenter chests and sewing kits age good. Picture books that spell out simple words -- and story records -- will keep a child quiet long enough to earn mother's gratitude. A cloth "tent" that can be draped over a card table, with openings for windows and doors, satisfies the need for a private place SIX YEARS

Six is all over the place, rougher in play, and a mess. They love to dig and build, especially in mud or sand. There is a strong feeling for paint and color, which supplants the live-year-old's cutting and pasting, and drawing is more skillful.

Much time is spent in pretense, playing house, cowboys, war games. Electric trains, planes and boats now get some attention. Some sixes enjoy numbers and simple games involving counting.

If books are on your shopping list, the six-year-old still likes animal stories and adventures of other six-year-olds. Some like poetry. Anagrams, dominoes, Chinese checkers and simple card games are





> Whether you are buying a poinsettia a gift or to brighten your own home this holiday season, you will have a healthier, prettier plant if you follow these tips from Michigan State University horticulturists:

Choose a poinsettia with dark green oliage. Fallen or yellow leaves indicate oor fertilization or a root disease. The bracts -- the red, pink or white parts usually thought of as the poinsettia

flower -- should be of good size and color The red or green button-like parts at the center of the bracts are the actual flowers They should have little or no pollen on

Before taking a poinsettia outside, be sure it is wrapped well. Exposing it to low temperatures for even a short period of time can cause leaves and bracts to turn brown and fall off. At home, place your poinsettia near

sunny window or in some other well lighted place. Do not let any part of the plant touch the cold window panes, and keep the plant out of drafts from radiators air registers, or open doors and windows. Poinsettias prefer a temperature range of 60 to 70 degrees. Higher temperatures will shorten the life of the bracts. Coole temperatures at night (55 to 60 degrees) will help keep the plant in bloom the max imum length of time.

The soil should be checked daily and e plant watered only when the soil is dry to the touch. Water until the soil is oaked to the bottom of the pot, but do not water more than necessary. Overwatering will cause the lower leaves to yellow and drop. Underwatering will cause the plant to wilt and the lower leaves to

Contributions to the traditional double-barred cross Christmas Seal Campaign in Washtenaw County through the Thanksgiving weekend totaled \$17, 209.00, which is slightly more than the amount contributed last year at this same time, according to an announcement by Dr. Walter Meier, president of the Michigan TB and Respiratory Disease Association. Dr. Meier cally every youngster in elementary schindicated that statewide contributions at this time are running about 3.3 percent ahead of last year's contributions.

He urged persons to use the colorful blue Christmas Seals on their holiday mail and to send their contributions in advance of the Christmas holidays.

Funds received support programs of research, medical education, community service, and educational activities to reduce suffering and death from chronic respiratory diseases.

Dr. Meier pointed out that currently research activities are being conducted at Wayne State University to study the rejection problems in lung transplants. At the University of Michigan, researchers are trying to identify some of the characteristics of muscle fibers of the diaphragm and the relationship these might have to chronic lung disease. At Michigan State University, research activities are being carried out to develop a better tuber culin skin test than the one currently in use. Such a test would make it easier to diagnose tuberculosis. Also at Michigan State University, work is underway to study pulmonary fibrosis, a common occurrence in lung diseases.

At each of the medical schools in the state, fellowships are sponsored by Christmas Seal funds to assist in the development of physicians with special training in pulmonary diseases.

Community service programs, ranging from smoking withdrawal clinics to breathing exercise and recreational clinics for youngsters with asthma, are supported by Christmas Seal contributions.

An important service developed by the Christmas Seal association during the past year is an improved referral program THE MANCHESTER ENTERPRISE

for patients with lung diseases. Many of these persons looking for help have found only deadend streets, Dr. Meier said. Our goal is to provide the kind of referral information that will help patients with ulmonary diseases get to the agencies that can provide them with medical, eco omic and other forms of assistance.

Christmas Seal contributions also pport health education programs in sch ools and among adult groups with practiool in Michigan being reached by our educational activities, Dr. Meier said. These include a popular children's pubcation, "Children's Health," which is mailed to every classroom teacher monthly during the school year, and frequent visits from entertainer-educator, Rancher Glen. who mixes folk songs with valuable antioking and other health information.

The 1972 goal of the Christmas Seal gency for Michigan counties, other than ne Detroit metropolitan area, is \$925,000 The help of every citizen is needed to enable us to reach this goal, Dr. Meier




