





COOKIES CALL FOR CRUSHED PEPPERMINTS

CHOCOLATE MINT DROPS Makes 41/2 dozen

½ cup shortening, soft 1 cup sugar ¼ cup finely crushed

2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 1 teaspoon baking powder 1/4 teaspoon salt 1 cup quick or old fashioned

1/4 cup milk

Beat together shortening and sugar until creamy. Stir in finely crushed peppermint candles. Add eggs; beat well. Blend in chocolate, milk and vanilla. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Stir in oats. Chill dough 1 hour.

Drop by teaspoonfuls onto greased cookie sheets. Bake in preheated moderate even (350°F.) about 10 minutes. Cool on wire racks. Frost with red and white confectioners sugar frostings.
