Council met in regular session with the meeting called to order by Pres. Little at 7:02 pm. Present were Beal, Daniels, Fitzgerald, Mahony, Scully and Walton; absent Curiey and Zsenyuk, Minutes from the November 18, 1974 regular meeting were read and approved in a motion by Walton, supported

by Fitzgerald, All yeas, carried, Fitzgerald reported that Gulf Oil Corporation wishes to terminate their lease as of March 31, 1975 on the property located on Ann Arbor Hill, Moved by Mahony, supported by Fitzgerald that a letter be sent to Gulf Oil Corporation advising them that as of March 31, 1975 all equipment must be removed and if it is not they will be billed at the new rate for a one year lease. All

yeas, carried. Public Works activities included sewer repair at the well house, grading sand for the new building, snow and ice cleanup, sewer and water tap-in on Summit Street, repair of three eatch basins and rodding of two sewers. The loader is down for repairs. The question of snow removal around cars was brought up. Fitzgerald expressed the feeling that it was not the Village responsibility to dig out cars that have been left in snow removal areas. He felt that the no parking during snow removal hours as posted at the Village limits should be enforced more strictly.

A concern regarding the use of snowmobiles on Village streets was voiced by Daniels, He suggested that snow removal should perhaps be postponed until snowmobiles were off the streets and no longer playing tag with the snow removal equipment. This is a thirty (30) year franchise, Questions regarding the possibility of another utility wanting the franchise were raised. According the Mr. Snedeker all such matters would be channeled through the Public Service Commission who would decide after looking into the services provided by the existing supplier whether or not the present service was inadequate and primarily on that basis could order the election of another company. In essence, Mr. Snedeker felt the chance of another service coming into the area was highly unlikely. Moved by Walton, supported by Mahony that the election forms for the franchise be checked by the Village attorney with a report due back to Council by December 16. Beal, Nay; Fitzgerald, Scully, Mahony and Walton, yeas. Motion carried, Mahony stated that the Village is at the outside limits of Consumers and Michigan Consolidated and felt that Council has the responsibility to check out the avalability from other sources. 





shrub into premature blooming. Take a mild day, preferably after a rain, go out and select bran-ches that bear plump buds and cut them off. Snip down at a slant almost at soil level. The length will be impressive when the branches are indoors and

standing tall. Now pound the base of each branch with a hammer, or crush and shred it with pliers; this will help it absorb the needed water, then let it stand at room temperature for five or six hours.

After that put the branches in a container of fresh water. Set the container in a basement or any other cool and dark place for two or three weeks. Replexish water frequently as it will be necessary during this time.

When the flower buds seem about to pop, they can be brought into the full light and warmer temperatures. You will have springtime flowers and fragrance during some of the dreary days following the colorful and busy holidays.







If a fire is not out before you retire, push the logs in to the rear of the fireplace or stand them securely into either corner. Be sure the fireplace screen is securely in place.
