Perhaps each of us could work a little harder and be a bit more efficient at our jobs. When we become more efficient at our task, it helps to beat inflation and boost earnings for all.

The United States was once so proud of its productivity that it assisted Japan in establishing a national productivity center to help increase that nation's output of goods and services. However, in the last four years the pupil has done better than the teacher. Japan's output per worker increased 43 percent while ours rose only 8.4 percent.

EARLY FILERS GET REFUNDS FASTER, IRS SAYS

Tax payers who file their returns in January or early February can expect any refund due in four to five weeks or roughly half the time late filers will have to wait, R. L. Plate, IRS district director for Michigan, said,

In urging taxpayers to file early, Plate said that individuals who delay filing until late March or April--the peak filing time-may have to wait for their refunds as long

Another advantage to filing early, according to Michigan's District Director is avoidance of careless errors often made by last-minute filers who are rushed. These errors -- which frequently involve incorrect arithmetic, use of the wrong tax table, or failure to sign the returncan further delay processing of the return as well as the refund check.

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



CRACKER CRUSTED HAM

If you are having company over for the New Year observance, one thing is fairly certain. Through the Christmas holiday period, they have likely been served ham on more than one occasion. For a change of pace, prepare your ham differently.

12 - 15 Be.

CRACKER CRUSTED HAM % cup finely crushed crackers 2 tablespoons dark brown sugar 14 cup corn syrup 1 teaspoon dry mustard

1 teaspoon grated orange rind With rolling pin, crush crackers between waxed paper into very fine crumbs. Sprinkle with sugar, mustard and orange rind, tossing well to mix; set aside. Heat ham, uncovered on rack in shallow pan, about 10 minutes to the pound in slow oven (325°F.) or until meat thermometer registers 130°F. About 40 minutes before ham is finished, remove from oven; trim any remaining skin and discard.
With sharp knife, score ham about 16 inch deep into diamond shapes measuring 11/2" x 1". Brush ham with corn syrup. Sprinkle and pat crumb mixture all over ham. Stud diamond pattern with whole cloves. Return to oven and continue heating. Let stand about 15 to 20 minutes at room temperature before carving.

Yield: Party of 12 with plenty of leftovers. For dessert, serve a new version of an old favorits. Pineapple upside-down cake in the form of a Christmas wreath will garner your guests' attention and praise.
