all. Sometimes I don't think he hears too well, but our family doctor says he's ok. I have asked my doctor if he can't do some tests just to be sure. Todd gets colds a lot and runny noses. Sometimes he cries and rubs his ears. Its when he

I need to work on an afternoon shift at the plant. I leave him with an older lady down the road. He seems to like her. There just aren't any kids for him to play with out here where we live. I have talked to a couple of girls I work with and they think I should have him checked. What do you think? What can I do?

Answer: By all means insist that your doctor check your son's ears more throughly. What you describe could be symptons of a number of problems, but your doctor needs to diagnose it. If your son isn't hearing well, then his speech and language may not develop well, since he may miss a lot of what would normally be good speech models for him to imitate. Your doctor may refer you to a specialist to check your son's hearing. Either doctor may then make recommendations for your son's hearing and, perhaps, his speech and language development. After you have seen the doctor and have beard the ctions, contact the special incettion director in your school district. (in Chelses, Sinichester, and Whitmore Lake, this Individual is Dr. Henry De-Young at 475-9131, extension 48.) The school speech pathologist, along with the director, can tell you whether or not your child is eligible for speech and language therapy (or other services); make suggestions for ways of helping your son; and possible recommend a pre-school program or nursery school into which he would fit. The special education staff in your school district is ready to answer

your questions and help you. 

The best way to be sure your Christmas tree is fresh is to take axe in hand and cut it down yourself at one of Michigan's many choose-and-cut Christmas tree

farms. The next-best way is to follow a few tips on cut tree selection and care from the Washtenaw County Extension Service.

Look for a well shaped tree with good color. Where you plan to set the tree should determine how tall and perfectly shaped it must be, A tree for use in front of a picture window, where it will be seen from all sides, must be shaped better than one to be set in a corner. Check for freshness by bending a needle

on the tree. If it springs back to its original shape, the tree is fresh. If it snaps or stays bent out of shape, the tree is probably too dry.

Bump the base of the tree on the ground. A shower of dry, green needles around your feet means the tree is dry.

Feel the bottom of the tree trunk. On a fresh tree, it will feel sticky and moist.


Removing this resin-clogged wood improves the tree's ability to take up water and slows drying.

Place the tree in a stand that has a container for water. Because the tree will absorb water very rapidly for the first few days, you may have to water it two or three times a day to insure that it allow the tree to dry out. Dry evergreens are extremely quick to catch fire. Commercial Christmas tree preservatives are of little value in maintaining freshness and reducing dryness.

Set the tree in a cool spot away from hot lights, heat registers or radiators. fireplaces, TV sets or other sources of

lights that carry the Underwriter's Laboratory (UL) label; and check them sockets or other hazards before you place

them on the tree. Following these suggestions will help your tree retain its freshness and con-

MINORITY WITH A MISSION

When a profession which once involved 95 percent of the population dwindles down to less than 5 percent in a short 200year span-do the members of that profession have to "learn to act" like a minority group? According to the president of the state's largest farm organization, the answer is yes. "I do not mean by this that we become howlers like the dog sitting on a thorn," said Elton R. Smith, dairy farmer who heads the Michigan Farm Bureau, "I mean we must grow to accept and express our responsibilities as individuals."

The farm leader spelled out how he thought farmers should accept and express their responsibilities as members of a minority group-by participating in groups dealing with energy, world food supply. transportation, consumer issues, land use planning and education.

"We are currently going through a time in history when it is the vogue to have symposiums and conferences on many subjects by many groups. Decisions made and government action demanded by these groups concern agriculture and farmers are not having an input. We just can't let this happen!" Smith said.

It won't be easy for farmers to sit is symposiums, especially when there's work to do out in the fields. But when they consider that one decision by lawmakers, brought about by pressures and demands from groups inexperienced and unknowiedgeable in agriculture, can create havoc in their industry and perhaps wipe out an entire year's profits -- this should be the needed incentive to "get involved."

Unlike some minority groups, farmers don't like being coddled. Convincing Con-





CHOOSING CHRISTMAS TOYS

Choosing Christmas toys carefully can help prevent injury to children, says B. Dale Ball, director of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

MDA's Consumer Protection Bureau enforces the toy safety law which is part of Michigan's Hazardous Substances Act, but consumers are the final watchdogs and should be alert when shopping.

MDA inspectors make random checks of electrical, thermal or mechanical toys,

examining labels to see if warning stateents appear. Spot checks are made to

assure that toys banned by the U.S. Product Safety Commission are not being offered for sale.

However, MDA doesn't have the manpower to examine many toys, and it's up to the consumer to select toys development. He advised parents or others who have bought toys they suspect might cause injury to keep the receipt and name of the store where purchased, and call MDA to investigate.

UP THE CHIMNEY . . .

A fire in the fireplace, glowing with friendliness . . .

A home decorated with cheery lights, symbolizing the spirit of the

Two of the many nice things about the nicest of all seasons. One saves energy and the other is wasteful, Right?

Wrong on both counts. It is generally thought that a fireplace fire adds warmth to a room and saves on fuel bills. But fireplaces as heating sources are very deceptive. The flue draws a large amount of air through the hearth and up the chimney. That air comes from inside the home and has already been heated by the furnace, which means that although the fireplace is heating the immediate area, it is also cooling the rest of the house by expelling warm air up the chimney. This heat loss can be reduced by lowering the thermostat or closing off the room in which the fireplace is located. Glass fireplace doors in place of screens can help also. Still better is a fireplace with an air duct from the floor of the fireplace to the outside. This allows air for combustion to be drawn from the outside, doing away with the refleating of indoor air

Franklin and other stand-up type stores may offer a bit more heating efficiency because of their construction and because they radiate heat from all sides and the stovepipes. Also, the amount of air going up the pipe can be controlled. Fireplaces can also be improved as heaters by installing adapters that will blow the hot air out toward the

Whether it's a fireplace or a stove, the damper should always be closed when the stove is not in use but only after the fire has been put out. Even a tiny crack of an opening in the damper will let warm air escape.

... AND ON WITH THE LIGHTS

fraction of that is used for holiday lighting. So instead of discarding tradition, why not follow some of these energy-saving practices:

- 1. Use "midget" type lights on the Christmas tree. Midgets light sets use only 18 watts regardless of the number of bulbs in the set, be it 20, 35 or 50. Five 50-light sets of midgets - that's 250 lights use less electricity than a single 100-watt bulb. Using five 50-light sets of midgets for four hours daily would add only about 1-1/2e a day to your electric bill:
- 2. "Cool" type bulbs, which use 6. watts per bulb, can be substituted for the normal bulb, which uses 7 watts per bulb. On a large Christmas tree, this can save considerable energy. Even when lit, the bulbs are cool enough to touch. As a result, they can be used on plastic as well as live
- 3. Use a generous proportion of white or clear bulbs. This will help light the room and may allow you to turn off some or all of the room lighting.

- 5. The use of "twinkle" type bulbs will reduce energy use by about one-half. They are available in midget as well as the normal size Christmas lights.
- 6. Turning off the tree lights when there is no one home to see them is a good energy-saving and safety
- 7. If outdoor lighting is used, such as under eaves and canopies, space lights as far apart as possible.
- . Only operate for limited periods to obtain the desired effect, such as from dusk to 9:00 PM or 10:00





FREEWAY MOTORISTS GET WEATHER

Motorists traveling all interstate freeways in Michigan this winter can obtain up-to-the-minute weather information on their car radios as the result of a cooperative program involving the Michigan Association of Broadcasters, the State Police and the Department of State Highways and Transportation.

The Highways and Transportation Department has completed erection of 35 large blue and white signs headed by the

lecend: WEATHER INFO. Each sign will carry up to four frequencies of cooperating

radio stations. Motorists can turn their far radio to one of the four frequencies and be assured of getting current weather information every 15 to 30 minutes during periods of severe weather.

State Police will feed information on driving conditions to radio stations involved in the new reporting service.

The service was inaugurated as a pilot program on three freeways last winter and has now been extended to all interstate freeways in Michigan. The Federal Highway Administration, which is encouraging freeway weather information signing, paid 90 per cent of the cost.

The Michigan Association of Broadcasters emphasized that 'this is a service to the public and not an advertisement for radio stations -- hence, call letters will not be shown."

Most radio stations participating in the service operate 24 hours a day, sevon days a week, and have transmitting strength to cover up to 70 miles of the particular
