



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Tornado survival checklist

Tornado watch

A "tornado watch" is a notice that weather conditions are ripe for tornadoes. Turn on radio or television and listen for weather bulletins. Occasionally scan the horizon for dark, threatening clouds. Stay alert. If in doubt, take cover. Tornadoes can develop so quickly there may not be time for a tornado warning.

Tornado warning

A "tornado warning" means a tornado has been sighted or indicated by radar. If it is nearby, seek the best inside shelter immediately, preferably in a storm cellar, underground excavation or steel-framed or concrete-reinforced building.

Office buildings

Go to an interior hallway on the lowest floor, or to a designated shel-



Factories

Move quickly to the section of the plant offering the greatest protection, in accordance with advance plans.

Homes

The basement is the safest place. Seek shelter under heavy furniture if possible. In homes without basements, take cover in the central part of the house on the lowest floor, in a small room such as a closet or bathroom, or under sturdy furniture. Keep some windows open, but stay away from them.






Schools

Follow advance plans to an interior hallway on the lowest floor. Avoid auditoriums, gymnasiums or other structures with wide, freespan roofs. If you are in a building which is not of reinforced construction, go quickly to a nearby reinforced building.

Mobile homes

Mobile homes are particularly vulnerable to destructive winds. Proper tie-downs may prevent overturning, but do not stay in a mobile home when a tornado is approach ing. There should be a designated community shelter where you can go. If not, seek refuge in a sturdy building or, as a last resort, in a ditch, culvert or ravine. Lie face down and cover your head.





Autos/open spaces

If there is no time to find suitable shelter, lie face down in the nearest depression, such as a ditch, and protect your head with your arms. If you are in a car and can drive away from a tornado (crossways to the direction the twister is moving), it may be worth a try. But don't stay in a car if it is in the tornado's path.

JUST ONE PERSON

Can one young farmer from Michigan, visiting an urban Congressman in Washington, D.C., bridge the geographic/ social, interest gap between them and make any kind of effective impact? Perhaps not in terms of changing the Congressman's vote on a particular issue, because he stays in Washington only by responding to the will of the people he represents -and often that will is not the same as the farmer's. But the young farmer can still return to his farm knowing that when that Congressman casts his next vote on an issue that involves agriculture, he will do so with a bit more knowledge than

before his visit. Several Michigan farmers had that experience recently when a delegation of them visited the nation's capitol to talk to Congressmen about issues of concern to the agricultural community. They do this annually through their organization, the Michigan Farm Bureau, and usually they confine their visits to the representatives within their own districts. Communicating with urban Congressmen was a new experience for many of them and no doubt a new experience for the

legislators as well. It was a beneficial learning experience for both. The farmers gained an insight into why a Congressman introduces a piece of legislation: it's in response to needs expressed by the people "back home" in his district. The Congressmen gained some insight into how legislation affects the farmers, a completely new angle to many of them because they have no farmer-constituents. For example, there's a lot of pressure from urban consumers these days for absolutely "pure" food. Sounds appropriate to the Congressman, so he introduces or votes for legislation aimed toward that goal. He is not aware, perhaps, that modern agriculture cannot provide sufficient quantities of high quality food without the use of agricultural chemicals and drugs. When farmers tell him that any undue curtailment of the safe usage of these products will result in lower quality and




