





Mr. Rickert des that "this is only the tip of the coberg. Besides the regular builtet, there are also separate budgets for a number of UN agencies. Most of our contributions to the United Nations go to help finance these separate budgets. In fact, during the two-year period of 1976 and 1977, we gave the United Nations a cool \$1 billion. which was about 40 percent of total UN

garaged where they now are and a couple of members of the department were qualified as drivers of the large tank truck and the first one that arrived at the fire house when the alarm sounded opened the doors, started the motor on the truck and perched behind the wheel ready to take off the moment that the rest of the crew arrived.

At the time we speak of, Art Hanewald was one of these drivers and as he lived only a half block or so from the fire barn, he was usually the first to arrive.

On the night that we speak of, the siren sounded and Art, dressing hurridly, dashed down the alley and unlocked the sliding doors, but when he tried to push them open he found that they had frozen shut when the temperature had fallen drastically during the night. He tried valiantly to budge the doors as did a couple of others when they arrived but no avail. In desperation, Art surveyed the situation for a few moments then dashed into the building and jumped into the drivers seat of the truck. Then he started it up and shifted it into reverse, and stomped on the accelerator. The truck lurched backwards and with a resounding crash backed through the frozen doors and soon the vehicles were on their way to

answer the alarm.

If I remember correctly there was onsiderable criticism about the act but in a few days workmen arrived and installed overhead freeze proof doors. Maybe this was not the correct way to solve a critical problem but it was very effective. And by the way, does anyone remember the time that Earl Alber, rushing to answer a fire call shortly after he moved into his home on West Main Street, stumbled into his garage, only partly awake, and proceeded to back his car out to dash to the fire barn only to discover that he had forgotten one little thing-he had forgotten to open the garage door.

But throughout these years. Manchester has had a Fire Department of which they can be proud, and I don't think that the average person stops to realize how much time and effort the members all have given with little regard for their personal safety.
