In Retrospect

Melvin Fleckner, of North Baltimore. probably knows Ohio better than any other

Mr. Fleckner has been to hundreds of towns that are not even there.

Lest this be confusing, his lifetime hobby has been tracing old post offices. These buildings and communities are, for the most part, distant memories.

For example, who in Wood County would remember the hamlet of Paragon? Easy. Paragon was two miles west of Wingston. Wingston? Well, that was one mile north of

"horse-and-buggy" era, Ohio had countless settlements, Mr. Fleckner recalls. Each community had its own post office.

From history books, Mr. Fleckner traced all of them in the sprawling 88 counties of Ohio. He visited these places, taking photographs of where the post office stood. He also collected postmarks wherever he could find them.

Sharing these research trips was his wife, the former Mac Croll of Oak Harbor. She died last August shortly after they returned from a European trip.

Since then Mr. Fleckner sold his extensive collection, some 6,000 items such as postmarks, maps, photos, and stamps, to a former Findlay resident, Loring Ebersole, of 19825 Sharon Valley Road, Manchester, Mich. 48158.

Mr. Fleckner passed on Mr. Ebersole's address should anyone have an inquiry about a community that no longer exists. Mr. Fleckner constantly received inquiries, especially since "Roots" sent many persons into the search for the long ago.

"Our research trips were fun," Mr. Fleckner said. "We found a few older residents still living in or near the community. They were eager to talk about the past.'

These excursions into the byways of Ohio were made on weekends by the Fleckners since he had a clothing store in North Baltimore. After the store closed, he joined the former Bowling Green plant of H.J. Heinz Co., and later became the first business manager of the Penta County School system.

Mr. Fleckner's neatly indexed file system listed these old post offices in Hancock County: Beagle, Houcktown, Shawtown, Deweyville, Mortimer, West Independence Finley, Moffitt, Wineland, New Stark, Oak Ridge, Hassen, and Portage Center.


The American Legion Auxiliary was held December 13 at the American Legion Home with the annual Christmas potluck



Don't shovel within an hour after eating. Don't smoke during the period you're shoveling. Cold weather itself is a strain on the heart, as the body constricts the blood vessels in an attempt to conserve heat. Smoking, too, constricts the blood vessels.

Don't shovel to the point of exhaustion. Dress warmly-wear a hat, muffle your ears and throat, and keep your hands and

SURVIVAL KIT FOR WINTER MONTHS

Disasters on the highways during snow storms and blizzards can be alleviated if the traveller will carry a survival kit with him during the winter months.

The American Red Cross Disaster Co-chairmen for Washtenaw County, Dale Richards and Jack Gray, have recommended that travellers carry the following items in their survival kit when travelling the highways during the winter season: 1. Emergency drinking water in a plastic

2. Canned foods which can be easily opened and eaten and a can opener should be

3. Instant coffee and instant soups as well as candy bars, should be carried for each member of the family who is travelling. 4. It is also suggested that a small sterno stove with matches and a small pan or kettle be carried for heating water. 5. Blankets or sleeping bags should also be

carried if the trip is to be an extended one. 6. A flashlight and emergency flares, toilet paper and a disposable emergency container for waste material should be carried. 7. If individuals are going to be travelling for any length of time, they should carry prescriptions for drugs which they might

8. And, last but not least, every automobile should have an emergency first aid kit.

Snow mobilers and four wheel drivers for Washtenaw County, who serve under the chairmanship of Daniel Winkler, meet the needs of stranded travellers and residents of Washtenaw County who might be isolated on back roads during heavy winter

The county is diveded into fifteen emergency zones each of which has as its' center a shelter in a public school building or major church in the area. Each zone has a team of snow mobilers and four-wheel drivers, as well as a shelter management team to which individuals may go in the event of a disaster whether it be blizzard snow conditions, tornado or other disaster.

MICHIGAN CHEESES FOR SNACKS

After a busy holiday season, a quiet evening by the fireside with friends is a welcome change of pace. Tasty snacks from fine Michigan cheeses can be easily prepared for such an occasion.

More than 34 million pounds of cheese was produced in our state last year, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture, including cheddar, Colby, Monterey, Italian, Muenster, brick, cream and farmer cheeses.

Michigan has 15 cheese factories, with major cheese production in Arenac, Bay, Clare. Menominee and Wayne counties. Our state also ranks fifth in the nation in cottage cheese production.


There are more than 400 varieties of natural cheeses, each distinctive in flavor, body and texture. Method of coagulating milk, kind of milk used, type of culture and ripening conditions determine the kind of

Cheese contains many of milk's nutrients including protein, calcium and vitamin A. To make one pound of cheddar requires 10 pounds of milk. Three ounces of cheddar has about the same protein as three large eggs or three ounces of cooked beef. Five ounces of cheddar has the same amount of calcium as 3½ cups of milk.



Most new models this season have been tailored for the recreational skier between 70 and 150 pounds, a range that covers the bulk of the skiing popu-

Most distributors have purged themselves of obsolete merchandise. There will be very little cheap close-out equipment available, and close-outs should not be confused with good economy

Practically all manufacturers are offering ski brakes this season, but only a few have made them as an integral part of the binding package. Other manufacturers have chosen to wait and see what restrictions ski areas and state

legislatures will put on the ski brakes.

SKIING Magazine has tested ski brakes for three seasons and concludes that most of the new designs will stop skis effectively under most recreational conditions, but only a few are effective under extreme conditions of ice and steepness, and none will restrain an airborne ski. The last condition has worried area operators because of the risk of skis falling from lifts which cross ski slopes. Rules are pending which may require the use of an attachment while traveling on the lift.

Price should not be the primary consideration in selecting a binding. In fact, a higher priced binding is not always a guarantee or even an indica-

At this time there were no Jaycees, Optimists nor Chamber of Commerce, but this club filled the community's need for a service club.

It was located in the rooms on the second floor of the buildings which housed the tavern of Mery Kern and the meat market of Trolz and Eschelbach on East Main Street east of the river. In the club rooms were card tables, a pool table, a kitchen, etc., and there each evening gathered various of the fellows who had no families or who had perhaps been chased out of their homes. The club's heyday, however, was and local area churches. the annual feather parties held by the group before Thanksgiving and Christmas. They were looked forward to by most everyone and provided the funds with which the group did its good deeds during the year and they did many charitable deeds. Most everyone planned on attending both these events and a great deal of the holiday poultry was accumulated at these times. The tickets were very reasonably priced and the refreshments were excellent and the poultry first class.

As time went by other organizations were formed and seemed to take over the functions of the club and its prominence gradually faded and the club faded from the
