



Spend Wisely

Despite the myth that Food Stamp customers spend more on "junk food" and expensive cuts of meat than others, a newly-released U.S. Department of Agriculture Study has found that Food Stamp users actually spend more wisely than higher income shoppers. The study, by Donald A. West, a professor of Agriculture Economics on leave from Washington State University, analyzed data from the 1973 -1974 Consumers Expenditure Survey by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

West found that Food Stamp shoppers spent less on bakery products, prepared foods, high sugar items and expensive meat than others. They spent more on cereals. flour, vegetables, pork, poultry, eggs and milk than non-participants.





As we read over the vignettes that we wrote about Carl Wuerthner and Laurence Wurster and enumerated the thongs that they did for Manchester because they loved their home town and felt that it was just about the best place in the universe, we were reminded by our memory, that there were others who also should be mentioned. Among them was Charlie Waltz who at this time, lived on East Main Street, a

couple of houses east of City Road. \*Charlie was, at one time if I remember correctly, a farmer who had retired and moved to town, and who, having been busy all his life, soon began to take an active part in the life of the community. He was a director of the Peoples Bank and his many friends drafted him to run for Supervisor and he was an easy victor.

He served most efficiently for several terms when along came the famous or infamous depression of 1930. Of course it wasn't long before a welfare system had to be set up and the WPA work projects appeared on the scene. In those days there were not quite as many chiefs as nowadays. There were more Indians. For instance the powers that were rightfully decided that the welfare should help those who really needed it and provide work for those who were perfectly able to do so and that those who were able were to work or not to receive aid. In order to efficiently admin

inter their mile and program of the decided to appoint the Supervisors in the various Townships as administrators. This. of course, was the efficient thing to do. Charlie knew every chick and child in Manchester Township and had the utmost sympathy for those who were the unfortunate victims of circumstance, but he had none for the few who tried to freeload There may have been a few who hated his intestinal fortitude but even those I think admired his fairness in dealing with a nasty

It is evidently too bad that our present system can't be as efficiently administered It would surely save us millions or billions.

Then too, he was intensely interested in most anything that was of benefit to the town. We remember for instance, that when the campaign was on to induce local people to buy stock when Double A was considering moving to Manchester from Ann Arbor, he worked hard to induce folks to invest there and he did so himself and later became a director of the company.

He and his charming wife had no children and I don't even know when they passed away but he and the things that he did for "our town" should not be forgotten.

Using projected inflation rates, the Social Security administrators say that a rather typical trip to the supermarket, 70 years from now, will require that you carry \$2,000 and that you be expected to spend almost all of it.

For example, a loaf of bread then will cost about \$40. A newspaper or telephone call will cost nearly \$10 each.

A medium-sized car will cost more than a quarter-million dollars and an average home will run three to four million dollars. To pay for these things, the average

worker will need to earn about a million

dollars per year in salary. The Social Security tax on that amount of

salary will be more than \$50,000 a year. These projections (remember, they are projections, not guess-work predictions) are on-track and will occur-unless....Unless our country's economic system falters and fails




