Sackner, M.D., -director of medical services at Mount Sinai Medical Center in Miami Beach-tested the effects of hot chicken soup as well as hot and cold water. Sipping hot water increased the speed of mucus moving through the nose. But chicken soup caused the mucus to move even faster than did the hot water. Drinking cold water reduced the movement; even after half an hour the rate of mucus movement was not back to normal levels.

The same fluids were also sipped through straws from covered containers. Hot water had little effect:but the hot chicken soup still made the mucus move faster.

According to Dr. Sackner, who is president-elect of the American Thoracic Society, the medical section of the American Lung Association, movement of mucus is one of the body's lines of defense against dirt and infection. A sheet of mucus moves continuously along the linings of the nose as well as in the air passages of the lungs. The mucus deposits dirt and germs in the throat, where they can be spit out or swallowed into the digestive system and rendered less harmful. Coughing helps clear out the passages below the throat; and


Doletzky said Secretary of Agriculture Pob Bergland has designated February 15 to April 30 as the period for farmers to file intention to participate in 1979 set-aside programs. Farmers have two weeks longer than originally established.


He emphasized that farmers must signup to be eligible for barley, corn, sorghum, and wheat on participating farms and on other normal crop acreage grown on the farm.

Farmers must also signup for voluntary diversion payments on, corn and grain sorghum. However, Doletzky said there will be no advance voluntary diversion payment for 1979 crops.

There are approximately 2.050 farms with normal crop acreage (NCA) in Washtenaw County. This includes 132,960 acres of eligible land to plant grain on and set aside required acres for program purposes. The program is flexible and can assure eligibility for benefits.



**IDLE HANDS** 

We all know that the most serious aspect of unemployment in this country is the jobless rate among teenagers, running up to 40 percent in some of the inner cities.

It has been evident for some time that a good portion of this problem has been created and is being sustained by a set of laws and regulations unwisely put on the books by state and national lawmakers.

During the last session of Congress, the House of Representatives failed by one vote to pass an amendment to the Fair Labor Standards Act to provide for a 15 percent differential in the federal minimum wage for young people. A tie vote was broken by Speaker O'Neill himself at the bidding of the labor movement and assorted do-gooder groups which will go to any end to discourage gainful employment among exempt those under 18 from state minimum wage laws entirely-but the federal law still prevails.

The latest example of this wrong-headedness is an interim report by the National Study Commission on Unemployment Compensation. Congress had referred to that second in sweet cherries, according to the Commission the question as to whether full-time students 16 and under should be exempt from the Act and employers not required to pay the tax on their wages, since they never qualify for benefits. The Commission said no, it didn't think it is a good idea, since it might encourage efforts or other exemptions.

Any employer will tell you that a great many more teenagers could be gainfully employed if these restrictive and costly laws could be amended or repealed. But, in the meantime, idleness festers trouble in



# YOU CAN DO I'

CHAIRLIFT SAVVY: STAY WITH YOUR PARTNER

Many skiers get into trouble when they slide onto a chairlift loading platform. Frequently, problems occur because they fail to line up next to each other. When (A) the skier furthest back sits down, he tilts the chair back momentarily. As the chair swings forward again, it delivers an unsettling blow in

To prevent accidents and insure easy loading, watch the couples ahead of you ski onto the chairlift loading platform. Frequently, lift attendants keep special marks swept clean to indicate the proper place to stand. Be sure to ine up right next to your partnerneither ahead nor behind-as the chair approaches (B). Settle down easily into the seat and you'll be off for a pleasant ride up the mountain

# **YOU CAN DO IT**

Tree Slaiom to improve Rhythm

Skiers have been told for years to get the weight on the downhill ski, and as modern ski technique develops, the emphasis has been on using independent leg and foot action to make a better turn.

The tree slalom exercise will help improve rhythm, timing, and the feeling of going from outside (downhill) ski to outside ski. Find a row of trees or rocks. Now run at a good pace, making your turns round and feeling the weight transfer from one outside foot to the other as you turn. Imagine that you are skiing, trying to make your weight go to that new downhill ski as early in the turn as possible. Make your "course" at least 50 yards long and try to run through it five times. Run the course once making small slalom turns, the next time making large, giant slalom turns. This exercise is fun and will help you condition your legs for the upcoming


