Section 3.

LIBRARIAN RETIRES

Mrs. Dan Boutell, Head Librarian at the Manchester Township Library, is retiring effective April 1st, 1979 after twelve years of dedicated service to the community. She will however, remain for while as consultant to the new librarian and staff. Prior to becoming Head Librarian, Mary worked at the Edna G. Bentley Memorial Library in

Perry, Michigan. In 1962 she became a member of the Manchester Library Board of Trustees and served a complete three year term. She was re-appointed to another term in 1965, but resigned to become Head Librarian in 1966. At the time Mary was or the Board of Trustees, the library was part of the Washtenaw Area Library Association. She was elected president followed by a term as treasurer for the Association. She was also treasurer of the Township Library Board.

Mary's greatest gift to the library is her talent for organization. She moved the Periodical Rood from the basement to the second floor, added the large bookcase in the Reference Room, built up the book collection to include most of the best sellers. and had courage to weed out and retire books no longer desired. This has been a period of growth, circulation now exceeds 20,000 annually. When paper backs first came on the market she recognized them as sound library material. The library is now beginning a third rack of these and the wide collection appeals to almost every reader. Constant up dating on the shelves means parallel changes in the card catalogue; this job she attended to religiously. A custom made check-out desk and rugged carpeting has been installed under her supervision. Mary's willingness to help patrons of all ages, her integrity and cheerfulness always made a trip to the library a most pleasant experience. She will be missed but we all wish her well in the coming years.





Coupon Book Promotion

Better Business Bureau of Metropolitan Detroit cautions area consumers to take a close look a home telephone solicitations which feature a "shopping spree" and appear to offer over \$500.00 in "free" gifts. service, and merchandise.

This approach, which is currently being used in our area, is actually a promotion to sell coupon books for \$24.95, and any implication that the benefits of the book are "free", when they actually cost \$24.95, is

The Promotors of this coupon book set up a "boiler room" of telephone solicitors who will make calls to entire telephone exchanges with the sales pitch.

Coupon book telephone solicitations of this nature generally create an impression that an area resident has been specially selected to receive this offer when, such is not the fact.

It is the Bureau's opinion that it is misleading for a coupon book promotor to notify a consumer that he is eligible to receive anything of value, if in order to receive this item, a special service and handling fee of \$24.95 is charged.

The Bureau advises consumers to judge the value of a coupon book in terms of the \$24.95 cost, and not, the \$500.00 or \$1,000,00 value being claimed for it.

The California lettuce strike could be over by the time you read this, but it is still an issue that concerns all of us regardless of whether it's settled or not.

In spite of the "non-news" coming out of the lettuce fields, there are church and other groups still singing the praises of Chavez and his "non-violent" ways. In the meantime, violence continues and lettuce lies in the field to rot in California.







Burn Center Approved at U of M

University Hospital, Ann Arbor, received approval from the State Health Director February 28 to construct a separate building to be used as a Burn Center.

The multi-story facility will house thirty beds, two operating rooms, a four-room outpatient clinic, patient and family waiting areas, physical medicine and rehabilitation Automobile Club of Michigan employee area, social services, and research and Barb Kisch reminds motorists that the new black and white plates must be displayed by April 3. The thirty beds include two 6-bed intensive care units with hydro-therapy in each, six acute care and 12 rehabilitation beds. This project will consolidate all existing burn care beds in the Ann Arbor

health facilities service area, which includes the ten existing burn beds at University Hospital, six at St. Joseph Mercy Hospital, and 14 Rehabilitation beds at Chelsea Community Hospital. University Hospital will designate twenty of its medical surgical beds as burn beds.

The Burn Center will be dependent upon the main hospital for laboratory, x-ray, dietetics and housekeeping services. Cost of the project is \$6,437,000.







As we mentioned in a previous article there were several months following that day when we all had very little but learned to share what we had and became a close knit community and nation who had to band together to survive. Of course with no cash available and no market for most everything, prices tumbled rapidly and soon reached levels that today seem ridiculousalmost unbelievable.

Looking for an item concerning Manchester in the 1929's, the other day we ran Century Club met at the home of Maxine across a newspaper from Clinton in which was an ad for Fay's Market, and in this ad were the following specials for a weekend in December, 1929, but before you start drooling, let us remind you that at that time those still employed were getting all the way from \$15.00 a week up with \$30.00 a week which put one in an upper bracket. Then too, many had no jobs except perhaps WPA activities and were forced to obtain food from welfare organizations.

Prices listed included: Lard 7 pounds for \$1.00; Oleo, the best grade, 2 pounds for The Shakespeare Reading Club met on 47c; Crackers, 2 pound box 32c; Sugar. 5 pounds for 32c; Toilet Paper, 4 rolls 28c; Tomatoes, 2 cans 25c - large cans 17c; White bread, 3 for 25c; Mustard, 22c quart; Peas, 2 interesting items were displayed by the cans 25c; Palmolice seap, 4 for 29c; Pork Loin Roasts, 24c; Pork Steak, 22c; Spare Ribs 18c; Veal Roast 24c; Sauer Kraut, 2 pounds 13c; Beef Chuck, 19c; Picnic Hams, 19c; Round Steak 29c; Sirloin Steak 32c; and Hamburg 19c.

Most everything else was priced, for-Tuesday, April 3 at Emanuel Church Hall at tunately, in proportion. I remember renting a very nice house in Manchester at the time for \$12.00 a month and overall I was no better off then than now. I didn't have a bit more left then than now, even though we remember that at that time gasoline was 5 or 6 gallons for a dollar, and we remember buying a new tire for a Chevy for \$9.99.
