feature about the twenties and thirties that we hadn't touched on was a little mention of the Ginnivan Shows which, with their tent and their musical interludes and their personnel which varied not a great deal from year to year, was a feature of the summer season in Manchester when they came to spend a week with us.

I don't remember when they first came to town but it must have been in the early twenties. The Ginnivans who operated the show lived in Indiana and in early summer set forth to tour southern Michigan and northern Indiana, stopping a week at each location to present their plays and their vaudeville acts, to large audiences each night. The small towns seemed in those

days, to be starved for entertainment. After some years. Mrs. Ginnivan passed away and Norma Ginnivan carried on, presenting such high class dramas as "The Ole Homestead", "Aaron Slick From Pumpkin Creek", and others covering all the scope of drama and comedy between. Justice always triumphed and virtue was handsomely rewarded and the hero got the girl and the villian retreated, broken and beaten. And then too, the "vaudeville" acts between the acts was a feature not to be

For nearly fifty years these tent shows were a part of our life and we remember that the group always said that Manchester was one of their favorite spots where the audience was always large and apprec-

entertainment, or else we became, unfortunately, too sophisticated for these dramas and the participants including Norma Ginnivan became too old for this sort of endeavor and so the show vanished as a part of our life.

Three or four years ago a group of Albion College students prevailed upon Ginnivan's clown of many years who went by the name of "Toby" and who then lived in retirement in Jackson, to help them organize the tent of years they followed the Ginnivan's trail. They managed to make enough money to survive and most of them had a wonderful time, but they graduated from college and drifted apart and the tent was folded. evidently for the last time.

We've been told that there is one such unit left that is very much alive and doing very well which travels to the small towns of central Iowa but I suppose that these prosperous farmers are more than we are here in southern Michigan, And then too there are near here more large towns with movie theaters and probably more pictures with XXX ratings but these will never take the place of the Ginnivan Shows where the heroine "pure as the driven snow" fought desperately for her virtue and was rescued in the nick of time by the hero who dispatched quickly and neatly the villian, and who then with the gal rode "into the setting sun" and they lived happily ever

Saline High Selects **Trouble Shooting** Contestants

Four students from the automotive mechanics class at Saline High School, 7190 North Maple Road, Saline, Michigan 48176, have been chosen to represent the school at the first phase of the state championships for the annual Plymouth Trouble Shooting

The candidates, who were selected on the basis of their technical aptitude and scholastic achievements, are Todd Berger, 17, 611 Berger Drive, Saline, Paul Mahrle, 18. 11475 East Austin. Manchester, Jeffery Elsasser, 17, 197 Wallace Drive, Saline, and Tom Rossettie, 17, 8875 Chelsea Road.

The first phase of the Trouble Shooting Contest, which consists of a written test on automotive technology, was held April 3, 1979, at regional locations throughout Michigan.

"Those who have a high score on this written test qualify for the mechanical competition at Troy on May 16," Automotive Instructor Greg Baracy explained.

"There, they are paired off in teams and are assigned new Plymouth cars, all with identical malfunctions deliberately installed. Teams race the clock and each other to restore their cars to proper operating

The top team at the state championship, he said, will represent Michigan at the

National Trouble Shooting Finals at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, June 17-20. The contest brings together teams from all 50 states to match their knowledge and technical dexterity against each other.

At the National Finals, \$21,500 in scholarships are awarded to the top ten teams, including \$5,000 to the first-place finishers. The national champs also will be awarded expense-paid trips to Washington, D.C., and San Francisco, where they will compete against teams from Mexico and Canada for the North American title. During the year, the U.S. champions also will make appearances on behalf of Chrysler-Plymouth and its dealers to encourage students with mechanical aptitude to enter the challenging field of automotive

Since its inception in 1949, the Plymouth Trouble Shooting Contest has awarded 455 scholarships worth almost \$500,000. During that time, more than 28,000 participating students have been placed in full or part-time iobs as auto mechanics. Each year, about two-thirds of the entrants are offered iobs in the automobile business.

The National Association of Secondary School Principals has placed the Trouble Shooting program on its Approved list of National Contests and Activities.

Monies Received from Disaster Fund

The Village of Manchester in the 23rd District will receive approximately \$4,464 from the State Police's Disaster Fund as part of extra money approved by the House of Representatives recently, State Representative Mary Keith Ballantine reported

The House passed and sent to the Michigan Senate a supplemental appropriation bill that gave the fund \$2.3 million

in extra monies for the current fiscal year. "The extra funds are necessary because of the number of outstanding claims on the fund from communities across the state," Rep. Ballantine explained.

The fund currently has a balance of \$650,000, but the number of claims approved for payment totals more than \$2.4 million. When all the claims are paid, the fund will have a balance of about \$500,000. The disaster contingency fund is used to

assist communities which suffer unantic-

ipated costs due to natural disasters, such as floods, severe snowstorms, or tornados. "Though this supplemental appropriations bill must first be approved by the Senate and the Governor before the communities will receive the funds due them, I am nonetheless pleased that the Legislature is on the road to approving

Nearly all of the money in the appropriation will go to communities for payment of outstanding claims requested following the blizzard of January, 1978. About \$30,000 will be appropriated for flood claims in Allegan County.





IN RETROSPECT

Exhausted from the sixties and our exertions at that time, all we ask for now is relief. Six hours of relief help to get us through the day-all life once removed seems close enough. The impetus to think has slid into a slough of indifference.

We certainly haven't put on any show of unity during recent years. We can't get together on saving gasoline and oil in the face of costly imports nor controlling inflation that threatens disaster.

Lacking the challenge that seems to be a the almost universal abundance, expecting any legislation for common good.

With the urge to relax has come the conviction that the protection of national interests, by which the big powers survive, is not worth any personal sacrifice.

In the midst of plenty threats of economic disaster depress us. The dollar is only a a stab in the wallet. Americanism has been

Nowadays you deal with companies and computers, not with individuals. You can't make friends with a computer. You obey it. Big government throttles us with senseless rules that we can't even understand. Thieves and embezzlers operate without being embarrassed by doing so to anyone they know or the fear that they will be arrested by a policeman acquaintance.

Respect for government has vanished because of endless exposures of illegal acts and it must be that the week minded have decided that they might as well get theirs too. Many of us have decided that they cannot better themselves by going to the polls so only about a third cast their ballot.

History and writing have been neglected in our schools. We have a generation without a means of communication. Respect for education is at an all-time low. Churches, long a rallying point for humane action have lost influence. Many lobbies representing business, unions, lawyers, basis of a strong civilization. Americans doctors, oilmen, farmers, and many others who do not have much are looking about at seem to split us into factions and hamper

There's no single solution. Schools and colleges have restored, to some extent at least, requirements for the study of Readin', writing and 'rithmetic and in many cases, history and government. The revolutionary attitudes of the young people has

Do we flirt with the possibility of ending a form of government which has done more for more people than any other system that was ever invented. Are we doomed?

We have endured social revolution before. We were born in it and it took us fifty years to simmer down.

We learned a lesson from the stupidity of the Civil War, but afterwards we were able to become unified as never before.

After World War I we had suffragettes, the roaring twenties, college students with flasks, flappers in knee length skirts who rode to perdition in rumble seats, and civilization was accused of having collapsed, but prohibition was repealed, women got the vote and the young people went to work. Out of all this we became quite

Then the depression of the thirties shook us all. Soom the specter of starvation was removed and then we cried "Socialism" and "Communism". But we found ways to save

And now we're undergoing another social revolution and I hope we have the intelligence and guts to preserve the best of the past and adopt the good of the new. However it will take some real leadership to define and inspire a common purpose and a desire by all of us to accomplish it.
