- Make your own brass polish. Put 2 tablespoons salt into a cup of vinegar. Add just enough flour to form a smooth paste. Dip a damp cloth into the paste. Rub the brass until stains disappear, and rinse with cold water
- When adding new ceramic tile to your kitchen, be sure to tell your dealer the nature of the surface you'll be covering, so he can recommend the proper primer, adhesive and grout.
- Badly soiled chrome appliances, like toasters and toaster ovens, can be cleaned without surface damage with a mild abrasive liquid cleanser.
- Never chop or slice food directly on a ceramic tile or Formica® countertop. The glaze over the tile is thin and will be permanently damaged. Always clean the tile with a mild abrasive liquid cleanser to prevent scratching.
- The space around light switches is frequently smudged. After the space is cleaned, a thin coat or two of fresh clear shellac will make the area easier to clean.





SPECIAL USE OF SCHOOL BUSES

The Board recognizes the educations value of well-planned, carefully conducted educational trips, and realizes that such trips may require the transportation of large numbers of students. The Board therefore stipulates that school buses may be used as transportation for students instructional trips and extracurricular activities, in accordance with amounts budgeted for such purposes and subject to rules and regulations established by the

All arrangements for bus services for special trips, shall be made through the office of the Director of Auxiliary Services and the following general conditions shall

1. The Board delegates authority to the administration on requests for extracurricular usage in which the bus would return the same day. All students participating in field trips must ride to and from the destination on the bus.

2. Faculty spensors must complete a Request for School Bus" for all trips. 3. Only students enrolled in the Mancheste Community School District grades 5-12 may ride spectator buses to extracurricular events. Buses will be provided, at the discretion of school administrators, for varsity football and basketball games. tudents riding spectator buses to an extracurricular event must return to the point of origin on the same bus, unless otherwise authorized by the bus driver in charge upon presentation of parent's re-

. All requests for transportation not listed above will be referred to the Board for a decision. This includes requests for overnight trips.

SUPPORT SERVICES

The Superintendent or his designee authorized to approve the use of private vehicles for special activities when the vehicle is covered under the non-ownership liability protection afforded by the Board.

The Board may contract for transportation by private cars* for transportation of school children of the district whenever the Board determines that the cost is excessive for transportation by bus of children living in locations isolated from their school. Board allowances for private car trans-

be the first consideration in scheduling extra-curricular or other function, without private transportation for school events. To afeguard the students, the following policy shall be observed:

1. To use a private vehicle for school purposes, the driver must have the written permission of the building principal. This permit shall state the purpose of the field trip and the number of students involved 2. For all trips, a signed permission form from the parent must be obtained for each student in advance of the trip.

3. Prior to granting approval the principal must take into consideration the health and driving ability of the driver and the condition of the automobile.

SUPPORT SERVICES

Public Carriers

The Board authorizes the use of public carriers in those instances where it is deemed advisable by the Superintendent or his designee.

SUPPORT SERVICES Paying for Bus Trip Transportation.

The Board referencing Act #14 of the P.A. of 1974, permits the Superintendent to set a fee charge for students it transports to ride the district buses to attend nonmandatory and/or noncredit events by fellowing the guidelines of the State Department of Education.

Chargeable fees shall be determined by following the rules as developed by the State Board of Education and based upon the maximum allowable charge.

Further, students are not to be excluded from being transported if unable to pay the charge. Guidelines are to be submitted annually, for information, following, as soon as is practicable, action taken by the State Department of Education.

USE OF SCHOOL BUSES BY SENIOR CITIZEN GROUPS

The general philosophy of the Board of Education is that transportation equipment purchased by the school district is to be used primarily for school purposes, and that taxpayers shall not be expected to subsidize busing equipment or personnel for other

However, it is the policy of the Board to permit the use of a school bus not needed for school purposes by an organization or group composed of citizens 60 years of age or older, previded that no suitable or economically feasible private transportation is available and provided that such use does not impair the school district's own transportation services. As permitted by law, groups are expected to pay the actual costs involved in the use of school-owned transportation equipment, unless the Board

allows otherwise. Nonschool use of school transportation equipment shall not be intermingled with student transportation, nor shall it interfere with:

1. Student transportation to, from, or between schools. 2. Student transportation for school activ-

ities and functions. 3. Emergency transportation for students. Time required for maintenance and service of equipment.

5. Provision of standby equipment for school purposes. school transportation equipment shall be

developed by the administration and approved by the Board of Education. Legal Reference: General School Laws.

STUDENT TRANSPORTATION

The Board of Education shall purchase liability insurance coverage for the vehicles owned and operated by the school system. as well as for non-ownership vehicles used with a passenger capacity of 11 pupils or for school transportation. The administration shall develop the specifications, and seek bids from insurance agents to provide the desired insurance coverage.

No bus or other vehicle shall be used to transport students or other members of the The safety and welfare of students shall community to and from school, or to any proof that the vehicle is covered by liability insurance.

Legal Reference: General School Laws. 380.1321; 390.1332.


SCHOOL OWNED VEHICLES other than buses

The Board of Education recognizes the necessity for district owned vehicles to provide for the special transportation for students and staff, driver-training, and the transportation of supplies and equipment.

The Superintendent shall authorize the extent to which district owned cars may be used for official school business. Such cars shall not be used for personal purposes unless expressly approved by the Board.




