HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO U.S. -AMERICANS

Traditionally, Americans have long been classified as "joiners", a label many citizens are proud of.

Voluntarism is a typical USA characteristic that has helped shape the image of U.S. citizens in many countries. Americans are frequently pictured as friendly, outgoing and self-reliant.

Such a flattering concept probably dates back to the Revolutionary War era when our fledgling nation was struggling to survive. Self-reliance was then an essential quality.

These facts take on renewed significance as the nation prepares to celebrate the 203rd birdthday of the United States of America. The American Historic and Cultural Society, Inc., has vigorously promoted patriotic community programs through the preceding 21 days extending to Flag Day. The 21-day Honor America concept is a parallel to the 21-gun salute to honor a head of

This period was officially created by a joint resolution of the Congress and signed into law by the President in June 1975. Members of Congress, governers and mayors have actively joined in supporting this campaign and have called on their constitutents to participate.

A Census Bureau survey in recent years produced the estimate that 37 million people in the United States above the age of 13 years are engaged in volunteer work in the spirit of helping others.

Such a figure reflects a wholesome, generous attitude that has helped this nation become the leader of the world's democracies.

This total denotes a substantial bloc of Americans that by its example invites others to enter the field of voluntarism. To a casual observer it might seem that so many willing hands could dispose of the bulk of the country's social problems. Unfortunately, emergencies of assorted types, adversities and personal hardships continue to multiply.

Other circumstances call for different approaches. In Oregon, a 100,000acre site formerly used as a rocket-test range was turned over to farming by an aerospace company. The land lies in an arid region and the belief prevailed that "Nothing will grow here." But new methods of cultivation have produced rewarding crops and helped to revive the area economically.

In another corner of the country, Robert Sanchez, 29, worked with two scientists of the University of New Mexico to develop a program to produce nuclear drugs. This breakthrough enables hospitals to use the drugs as tracing agents for locating tumors.

Such undertakings contribute to the health and wealth of the nation. But these events are large and complex and beyond the scope of the average

But much can be accomplished at the local level to Honor America. You and your neighbors can arrange for appropriate patriotic decorations, centering around the American flag. Remind your club, your union or other organization to lend impetus to such observances, possibly of a financial nature. Remember John Adams' note to his wife Abigail: "... this great anniver-

sary festival ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance, by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty ... " Plan a parade, whip up a picnic, promote a sports contest, schedule a band concert, put on a pageant, touch off a fireworks display, honoring America

One point, at any rate is clear: no manner of organizational gadgetry can make a great society. It takes people to make a society great-righteous, justice-loving, idealistic, freedom-loving people.

Join us in giving America a Happy Birthday this Fourth of July.

In Retrospect

This year is the 100th anniversary of the writing of a book by Henry George. Henry was a man with a one-track mind. Born in 1839 in Philadelphia he became a journeyman printer, reporter and editor and early in his adult life went to San Francisco where he got the idea that became the driving force of his life.

One day he noticed that land in the downtown area there was selling for \$1,000 an acre-at that time an unbelievable sum and he became obcessed with the thought that there was something wrong with this. The people who were asking \$1,000 an acre for the land had done nothing to make it worth that. The land had gained in value because people came there, lived there and transacted business there.

He decided that the land, which he thought should really belong to the people. was being taken over by a parasitic landowing class. This was not news but his suggested solution was.


He advocated that all taxes be abolished and that a single tax on all land be substituted for them; that the unearned "rent" that unjustly went to the landlord should cover the costs of all government. This "rent" was to be taxed for the benefit of all the people and that all land should be owned by all the people, so he wrote a book explaining his philosophy. I suppose you might call this philosophy Socialism. Titled "Progress and Poverty" it is basically the philosophy advocated by Gov. Jerry Brown and others. Mr. George was perhaps a hundred years ahead of his time.

To explain his theory with an example: i the land down on the main four corners of town was occupied by a business that made a large profit, those who operated it paid a rather large "rent" for the use of the land occupied by their business. To equalize this amount an acreage of farm land of considerable size would be taxed on its ability to produce a profit, or at much less

Volunteers are assigned to the various 34 committees. Many are old timers and many chickens, for manning the pits, for preparing the radishes, for publicity and on and on. Men and boys, including boy scouts, the football teams and the junior and senior class members all work together as one big

happy coordinated team. Jim Mann's general supplies committee has a big assignment. They are responsible for procuring and purchasing all the needed supplies for the broil including 11,000 chicken halves, five ton charcoal, 60 crates cabbage, 1,000 pounds radishes, 1,000 dozen rolls, 400 pounds butter, 50 pounds coffee, success of the broil. It's hard work but it is 8,500 cartons milk, 12,000 paper plates and kits, 1,000 pair white cotton gloves, 120 pair

Publicity begins in early April and continues until it reaches it's peak in a two week period prior to the broil. Brouchers -News releases go out to all newspapers and TV and radio outlets over a wide area. Cooperation is received from all of the news media who contribute their time and space as a public service. Gill's Gamble Store, 126 East Main Street, is the Broil Headquarters. Over the years Irv and Donna Gill have been staunch broil supporters, spending untold hours on the countless details necessary to keep the program running

One of the main secret's to our broil's success lies in the proper preparation of the chicken. Only first grade plump fresh chickens are purchased, each half weighing approximately one and a quarter pounds. The chicken is slowly broiled on charcoal fired pits, buttered and slightly salted. cooked to golden perfection and served hot. For the 26th year Dr. Zindel will be with us to help oversee this important activity.
