

They are responsible for procuring and purchasing all the needed supplies for the broil including 11,000 chicken halves, five ton charcoal, 60 crates cabbage, 1,000 pounds radishes, 1,000 dozen rolls, 400 pounds butter, 50 pounds coffee, success of the broil. It's hard work but it is 8,500 cartons milk, 12,000 paper plates and kits, 1,000 pair white cotton gloves, 120 pair

Publicity begins in early April and continues until it reaches it's peak in a two week period prior to the broil. Brouchers -News releases go out to all newspapers and TV and radio outlets over a wide area. Cooperation is received from all of the news media who contribute their time and space as a public service. Gill's Gamble Store, 126 East Main Street, is the Broil Headquarters. Over the years Irv and Donna Gill have been staunch broil supporters, spending untold hours on the countless details necessary to keep the program running

One of the main secret's to our broil's success lies in the proper preparation of the chicken. Only first grade plump fresh chickens are purchased, each half weighing approximately one and a quarter pounds. The chicken is slowly broiled on charcoal fired pits, buttered and slightly salted. cooked to golden perfection and served hot. For the 26th year Dr. Zindel will be with us to help oversee this important activity.

Their natural assets are fewer than ours but in recent years quite a few folks from southern Michigan have migrated to the north country and have found it a far better place to live with a loyal, congenial group of people then the metropolitan area. Their outstanding characteristic seemed to be their outstanding loyalty to and pride in

their community. As we thought about it we discovered that Manchester had this quality. Both socially and economically they have been loyal. For example if their school needed any additional features they, at times, stuttered about the advisibility or the cost or both, but after careful consideration they obligated themselves to provide these additions. This I think is the supreme test of the awareness of how to make a prosperous

When we look about this part of the state and see, in several nearby towns, what seems to us to be a pitiful lack of this loyalty and cooperation. It makes us rather sad.

True, in this rapidly expanding area all of these nearby towns are growing, in numbers of inhabitants anyway, but the likeable personality of these towns has disintegrated or deteriorated but not Manchester's.

It is looking better than a few years ago; its streets are looking better each day, and even its people, it seems to us, are looking better than they did a few years ago.

In Retrospect

We read where the state is gonna provide breakfasts now for the "needy" children in our schools. There has been appropriated some fifty million dollars of taxpayers money for this purpose which will be added to the money now spent on the "hot lunch"

program Reading about this makes me think back to the days when the children walked to school carrying a lunch box containing their "not hot" lunch. Those were the days when many of us in our town were what nowadays would be classified as "needy". Many families had what now would be called marginal incomes, but we didn't even know it. We had sufficient clothing to wear and plenty to eat-sometimes the home grown pork had buttons on it after it was fried, but it and the boiled or baked potatoes and sometimes the fried corn meal mush with home grown vegetables and fruit were plentiful, and it seems to us that it tasted better than the carefully prepared canned or frozen stuff that comes out of the markets today. You don't suppose our taste buds have deteriorated do you? However it made most of us strong and healthy without our having any knowledge of a "balanced diet". Even our dogs did well on table scraps and didn't even know what a can of dog food looked like. We also got enough exercise to keep us healthy during "recess"--there's an obsolete word--and by walking to and from school. We played various games that we organized ourselves. This was true of both the village and city schools and also of the "country" schools which dotted the landscape every few miles, to which all the students walked.

Our mother, all during our school years, rose early and helped get us ready for school and always had ready for us a breakfast of rolled oats, or fried mush or "flannel" pancakes (in the wintertime) accompanied by homemade sausage, or

In our lunch boxes when we left for school, there were such goodies as a hard boiled egg or two, a bread and butter sandwich, and a small glass jar containing some homemade canned fruit and maybe a banana and a pickle and a small chunk of "rat trap" cheese. At our school we could purchase a half pint of milk which came in a glass bottle which was kept fresh after its daily delivery, in the refrigerator in the "domestic science" room.
