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VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER ORDINANCE NO. 108

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE THE USE OF PUBLIC PARKS AND PLAY GROUNDS WITHIN THE VILLAGE OF

THE VILLAGE OF MANCHESTER OR-DAINS:

Section 1. PURPOSE to regulate the use by all persons, organizations, and groups thereof all public parks and playgrounds, within the confines of the Village of Manchester.

Section 2. APPLICATION

This Ordinance, and the various subsections thereof, shall not apply to any use of parks or playgrounds operated by the Manchester School District within the wallnes on the Village of Manchester. Which use or uses are authorized by the Manchester School District. Furthermore, this Ordinance shall not be construed to infringe, conflict or restrict the powers, duties and authority of the Manchester School District.

Section 3. PARKING Section 3.1 No persons shall park flow of traffic within parks and play-

grounds.
Section 3.2 All vehicles shall remain on the drive portion of the park and playground.

Section 3.3 The operator of a vehicle parked or standing within a park or playgound must be within such park or playground.

from the park or playground at the close of the park or playground hours, as

imposed by Section 14 of this Ordinance, the owner or operator of any vehicle in violation of this section may have his or her vehicle towed and impounded, and shall be liable for the reasonable costs of the towing and storage.

Section 4. DANGEROUS OR OBNOX-IOUS MATERIALS OR EQUIPMENT

Section 4.1 No person shall deposit or abandon in or on any lands or water areas within the boundaries of any park or playground any barbage, sewage, bottles, cans, refuse, trash, waste or other obnoxious materials except in receptacles provided for such purposes.

Section 4.2 No person shall have in his possession or control any slingshot, pellet gun, air rifle, fireworks, explosives or other dangerous materials within the boundaries of any park or playground, unless such person shall apply for and receive a written permit from the village council to possess and operte said dangerous materials.

Section 5. SIGNS AND HANDBILLS

other circulars may be effered or distributed only within the automobile parking lots of parks and playgrounds, unless the prior written permission of the Village Council is obstained for offering or distribution outside such automobile parking

Section 5.2 No person shall post, fasten. paint or affix any placard, bill, notice or sign upon any structures, tree or automobile within the boundaries of any park or playground, except that temporary directional signs for group picnics or events may be placed on signposts designated for such purposes and must be removed at the conclusion of the event.

maintain a fire within the boundaries of any park or playground, except in vicnic stoves, fireplaces or spaces provided for such a purpose.

Section 6.2 No person shall dump any burning material or hot ashes into the boundaries of any park or playground unless such container or locality shall be marked as a receptacle for such material

Section 7. CLOSING OF PARK



THE DANGERS OF A NATIONAL GRAIN BOARD

Grain prices have reached their best level in about four years and-wouldn't you know it?--somebody wants to place the government in charge of marketing all grain. If anything could ruin the outlook for grain,

The bill to establish a National Grain Board was introduced by Congressman James Weaver of Oregon. It would, among Road. other things, designate the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) as the seller and marketing agent for all export sales of wheat, rice, corn, grain sorghum, barley,

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oats, rye and soybeans. Private exporters, including farmer cooperatives, could continue to operate as shippers under the auspices of the grain board.

What we would end up with is a state-controlled marketing system for grain with a politically set price instead of a free enterprise system with prices set by the

The idea is similar to the Canadian Wheat Board. One of its recent decisions was to withdraw Canadian wheat and barley from export sale because of shipping delays and labor problems. How would that decision, applied in this country, go over with our farmers, especially at a time when we know there is good world demand for grain?

Certainly other countries would like to see us adopt a National Grain Board because it would make us less efficient and slower to act. It would discourage new production practices and enable our competition to grab some of our markets.

It would come at a time when it looks like real prosperity is returning to the American grain farmer. Let's not ruin that.
