For other forest products, visit Grand Rapids, the nation's major producer of school, church and theater seating. The site of the world's only museum devoted exclusively to furniture is in nearby Holland. The Baker Furniture Museum there (616-392-8761) offers daily tours.

While other plants can't be toured, they contribute much to the state's economy. A Hastings plant turns out Pro-Line archery equipment while thousands of canoes used by families and wilderness campers alike are produced by Oscoda's Sawyer Canoe

FCIC Offers "Customized" All-Risk Protection For Wheat

The latest development in investment risk management is an all-risk policy that USDA's Federal Crop Insurance Corporation says wheat farmers can customize to their individual financial situation.

Under the New Wheat Insurance program which is being introduced for the 1980 crop year, a total of nine different protection possibilities are being offered according to Harlan G. Stull, District

Even the premium rates are being computed to more closely reflect the individual policyholder's yield and loss experience Stull points out.

Farmers can qualify for a 5% premium discount after the first year. With additional favorable years of insurance experience the discount can climb as high as 50%. Policyholders who have large or frequent claims will pay higher premiums.

Wheat farmers can elect to be paid \$2.50. \$3.00, or \$3.50 for each bushel his insured crop falls below the guarantee yield. Stull notes that the price elections indicated above are each 50c a bushel higher than a year ago in order to reflect wheat growers' increased cost of crop production. Stull



Food Stamp Update

The Food Stamp Act of 1964 was revised and passed by Congress in October, 1977. Congress intended these changes to tighten eligibility criteria, to facilitate participation by eligible households, to strengthen program administration, and to reduce fraud

The new procedures of the 1977 Food Stamp Act became effective March 1, 1979,

Effective July 1, 1979, in accordance with the Food Stamp Act:

The household standard deduction, the combined dependent care/shelter maximum, the income standards, and the food coupon allotments, are to be adjusted periodically as necessary to reflect prescribed changes in cost of living com-

If a household's monthly net income after deductions is at or below the highest amount allowed, and other eligibility rules are met, it can receive Food Stamps. The amount of stamps will depend on how much monthly income it has after deductions and the number of household members.



And speaking of spending money, the

price tag for extracting oil from shale, coal. crops, waste and hard-to-extract natural ges to eventually make us oil import free (by 1990), is noted to be Eighty-eight billion dollars. Now that's a good round sum, but I wonder if any of us can visualize what \$88,000,000,000 is? I personally have trouble imagining what more than the \$85,000 that a modern home costs at a minimum let alone what that amount plus six zeros is. But I've a suspicion that, as usual, it will cost us all, at least the run of the mill taxpayer, plenty. And there is one factor that we haven't heard discussed and that is just what do we get for our money. Is the amount of oil to be produced by this expenditure going to be cheap enough so that we can afford it or are we as in so many other cases going to pay for a program that will benefit a small group of our people while the rest of us finance it. Can't someone tell us approximately what we are going to get for our money, or are we going to see our experts and our legislators ride off in a cloud of dust in all directions, to accomplish very little.

We are thankful that these expenditures will have to be approved by Congress and we hope and pray that its members will do what is for the best interests of our country-all of it.

And by the way it was only 100 years ago that crude oil bubbling up from the ground in Pennsylvania and other places was termed "black devil" by many and resented as a sticky nuisance for which there was no need whatever.
