Can't someone tell us approximately what we are going to get for our money, or are we going to see our experts and our legislators ride off in a cloud of dust in all directions, to accomplish very little.

We are thankful that these expenditures will have to be approved by Congress and we hope and pray that its members will do what is for the best interests of our country-all of it.

And by the way it was only 100 years ago that crude oil bubbling up from the ground in Pennsylvania and other places was termed "black devil" by many and resented as a sticky nuisance for which there was no need whatever.





The broklet, prepared by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), describes the hazards of different types of insulation, explains how to figure the amount you need to use, offers insulation and safety tips for the do-it-yourselfer, and auggests precautions for people huying insulation.

William Ballenger, department director and Michigan coordinator for product safety information, arranged to have the booklets distributed free in Michigan because so many citizens are now considering insulating their homes to cut winter fuel costs and conserve energy resources.

"The Consumer Product Safety Commission has found that some home insulation can be a fire hazard, a skin irritant, or even cause respiratory problems from formaldehyde odors which can persist for months after installation," Ballenger said.







For the last several months I have been considering my personal future as well as that of the local schools. Recently, I have decided that it is necessary that I leave the field of school administration and hopefully find employment in some other occupation.

During the last few months we have solved some of the immediate problems and have others under control. Long term needs have been identified; however, their solutions may take years.

1. Curriculum and coordinated instruction meeting the needs of all will take several years of community work involving the board, the staff, interested citizens and outside consultants. Special interest groups and advisory councils must be involved. In all probability, extensive remodeling and replacement of equipment will be needed. 2. The establishment of an effective

communications system between all facets of the school community. This should be designed so as to build a basic trust and team relationship for all. 3. The development of an effective management team. School administrators, supervisors and directors must be trained,

encouraged and supported. Manchester must return to the values of the good old days, to where the Manchester Board and community are proud of their staff and the job they are doing and, in turn, the staff must be proud to be affiliated with the
