

Store potatoes in a cool, dry, dark place. They may turn green and sprout when stored in lighted areas. Temperatures for storage should be between 45 and 50 degrees to protect from spoilage but, since cold temperatures turn potato starch to sugar, making them taste sweet, potatoes should not be refrigerated.





M.E.A. - School Board Still Negotiating

With school in Manchester scheduled to begin this Thursday, August 30, for the teachers, it is unlikely that a contract agreement will be reached by that time.

Slow bargaining started in June due to the lateness of the Board in naming the original negotiator, Superintendent Robert Masten. Progress was further stifled in spite of the Manchester Education Association's (unit of the W.L.E.A.) request to commence negotiations in late February, as the result of vacations, and lack of preparation time. Further slowed by the resignation of Mr. Masten, an attorney was

Union President, William Symons and Chief Negotiator, Dick Gray, at this point, requested an extention of the previous contract, but the Board has presented several conditions attached to indicate their unwillingness for the teachers to return under those circumstances.




