I suppose that the term retrospect should refer, not only to local events as chronicled in this column but it also should include those which, while national or world wide in scope, affected in one way or another all of us, great or small.

IN RETROSPECT

F'rinstince, did you remember that September 1 marked the fortieth anniversary of the beginning of World War II? On September 1. 1939, Hitler's well trained army invaded Poland in an action which was the beginning of a five and a half year struggle to prove the supremacy of the "master race" which Hitler believed, was to conquer and enslave the world but which of course, failed to do so.

Before it all ended and the oppressor had been vanquished and Hitler had committed suicide in his mountain top retreat, an estimated 50 million lives had been lost as a direct or indirect result of this war. The monetary loss from this holacast is almost beyond comprehension and from it all we have never totally recovered. We fought this war to maintain every individual's freedom, but in the light of present day conditions throughout the world, it doesn't seem that we have accomplished very much despite all our sacrifices to realize our aim.

September 3, 1929 marks the 50th anniversary of the end of the gold plated prosperity of the 1920's and the events which began that day triggered the most chaotic depression of world wide scope that has ever been known and it seems to us old duffers who remember it vividly that what did happen then could happen today as suddenly and as thoroughly as it did happen

Stock market prices had climbed steadily from 1921 that day in 1929 when industrial stocks began their dizzy slide from an index of 381.17 to next to nothing. This slide culminated on October 29, 1929, which went down in history as "Black Tuesday" when the Dow Jones average plunged down 38.33 points. The next day it plunged down another 30.57 points or 11.6%. This paralyzing situation continued until July, 1932, when the low mark was reached, a

drop of 69% in 34 months.
