## Freshmen Testing Tuesday, January 15

Beginning on Tuesday, January 15 and continuing all week the freshman class at Manchester High School will be administered the Differential Aptitude Test (DAT) along with the career planning questionaire. It will be given in the social studies classrooms.

The DAT is based on the research finding that intelligence is not a single ability but rather a number of abilities possessed in varying amounts by each individual. The battery yields nine reliable scores including an index of acholastic ability. The students also will record their educational and vocational plans and preferences. Together, these form a basis helping students plan their futures soundly and for early identification of those with superior intellectual promise.

A special computer program considers the student information given with the test scores and creates for each student a Career Planning Report. The Report either confirms the appropriateness of the student's occupational choices in light of his or her abilities and expressed interareas to explore if the choices seem major crisis develops.

To Meet With Rep. Carl Pursell

Mr. Bart Bartols, fourth-grade teacher at Klager Elementary, Mrs. Pat Sahakian, Vice President of the Manchester Association for Talented and Gifted, along with Dr. Thompson, Superintendent of the Manchester Schools, were invited to meet Tuesday, January 8, 1980 with United States Representative Carl Pursell to discuss the need for counselors in the elementary schools.

Mr. Pursell, who is seeking the views of educators and parents regarding federal legislation proposed by Rep. Carl Perkins of Kentucky, invited selected representatives of the Manchester and Ann Arbon Schools to meet with him.

The exchange of thoughts between the invited representatives and Mr. Pursell was open and direct. Mr. Bartels stressed the need to provide services to the vast majority of students who are in the middle range. Mrs. Sahakian spoke of the problems talented and gifted students may face if they feel they are different in some way from their classmater


