

once and caught us napping. And it doesn't seem very bright that the union have asked for more and more wages that, of course, had to be added to the cost of the product until we priced ourselves out of the world's market.

I don't think one has to be a professor of economics to figure out what happened to many of us. The worker has lost sight of the fact that the profit motive is the basis for our whole economy. We just don't get something for nothing and we are going to have to get back to the fundamentals if we are to survive.

Management needs its representatives and labor needs its unions to accomplish this-to logically plan our future-one which will benefit each equally it can't work otherwise. News Of Good Things Growing

Even though popcorn was served at the first American thanksgiving, the popcorn business started 'popping' when movie-goers discovered popcorn and movies were a great combination. Today, popcorn is sold

About 85 percent of all popcorn is consumed at home, and is a favorite snack for dieters. Two cups of popcorn contain only 110 calories!

Americans consume approximately 40 million pounds of popcorn each year, with more than 7.2 million pounds produced in Miehigan, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Our state is ninth in the country in popcorn production. Here are some tips for popcorn connoisseurs on keeping and fixing this snack treat:

Store kernels in tightly sealed jars, preferably in the refrigerator. Inside each kernel of popcorn is a tiny measure of moisture. When the temperature is just right, this droplet turns to steam, builds up and explodes 30 to 40 times its original size. Lack of moisture in a kernel can keep it from popping. If this happens, sprinkle on of popcorn, tighten the cap and shake it. Then let it stand for a few hours.

For a different snack, try seasoned popearn. Combine one package enion soup mix, one-half teaspoon each garlic salt and hickory smoked salt, one teaspoon seasoned salt with one-half cup melted butter. Pour over the popped corn and stir.

Cocktail popcorn is prepared by mixing one-third cup butter with one and one-half teaspoons salt, one small minced garlic clove and one-fourth cup minced chives. Pour mixture over popped corn and toss.





Their performances in various fields has been despicable but don't forget that they were elected to their supervisory positions by you-the voters. There's only one way to rectify present conditions-turn the rascals out-and as someone has said "Get another bunch of rascals."

Seems like a great many of the "commentators" in our press think that the 1970's were periods of decline. They report that nobody trusted anybody and wasn't this awful.

I don't think that any of the chaps who wrote these articles are more than 25 vears old and I have news for them, the world didn't begin when they first became "journalists". One writer said way back in the late 1700's, that no man's life was safe when the legislature was in session. In early New England all elective offices


