### Observations

Last week's issue of the Enterprise contained two Letters to the Editor which should elicit quite an amount of discussion. The first was a letter written by Ed Fredricks, State Senator, 23rd district and comments on the neccesity of reducing business and State Income tax. There is no question that everyone would like to see a great reduction in taxes collected but pray tell me why on these two items. This shows typical legislative thinking over which we have been complaining frequently in the past. To begin with the usiness tax is minimal unless more than \$50,000 has been earned. And anyone that earns \$50,000 per year can well afford to pay tax. Even at \$50,000 it is a small tax so why all the concerns. At least money has been earned to be able to pay.

Next our good senator wants to cut the State Income tax banning retirement peome from any tax at all. Amazingly he


states that this amount will save .41/2 or retirement income between now and 1986. Rig deal. He does not say what that is in real money. So we did some figuring and on our retirement income and savings will amount to about \$10.23 per year. So our good Senator is like all the rest of the legislatures making a big deal over

If the Senator is really interested in the welfare of his constituents he should take a good look at the Personal Property taxes. For his information school taxes amount to 68% of the total property tax. 14% for the county, while Village, Community College, Intermediate school and special assessments take each from 3% to 6%. In short our Property Taxes would be quite bearable if we got rid of the School Tax.

However schools have to be paid for and thus a reduction in one tax must be replaced by an increase in another tax. Using the Senators 4.4% State Income tax as a criterian and again referencing my own income we find that if the Senator raises the State tax to 4.9% I wouldn't have to pay the 68%. That to me makes a whole lot more sense, (why not, it saves me paying). Basically all of our schools are filled with children belonging to parents that live in Michigan. But not all of these parents are property owners. Probably less than half of them are and although not all of them are laborers the percentage between being employed and unemployed is much less than between property owners and non owners. And it

The IRS also has some printed materials in Spanish and braille. The Spanish publications should be requested using the order blank, while the braille material is available through regional and subregional libraries located in every state.

Taxpayers can also receive help by dialing the IRS toll-free number that appears in their tax package and in local elephone directories.





In due time along came World War two and once again we were called to help save the democracies of the world, even after we had been told by our leaders as a campaign promise that "No mother's son will ever set foot on foreign soil".

Once again we went all out to produce guns and ships and planes and withstood uncomplainingly rationing and gasoline and tire restrictions and all the other problems that all out defense brought forward, and we sent the cream of our young men over seas to both sides of the world to do battle, and many of them never returned, but we kept our chins up and were proud of our good deeds, and most of our leaders.

Then about the time all the wounds from this holocaust had healed slong came Viet Nam with all its confusing questions and an increasing number of our citizens rebelled against it, honestly believing that we should not have been there and that we could not accomplish anything while there. We had protests of various kinds and some of our youngsters fled to foreign countries to escape doing anything for their native land by serving in the armed forces. I don't think most of them were cowards, they were just confused and by now who can say if they were wrong?

Finally that affair came to an end and for once peace reigned in the world-or at least as far as we were concerned-but we, especially our present generation, became more and more restless and uncertain of present and future and unrest was evident in many places. We became obcessed by many "isms", or "cukey" philosophies-like "woman's lib" which most of 'em have had
