





Census Takers Still Needed

Full-time, temporary jobs as census takers in this area are still available, Michael Berla, Manager of the local 1980 census office said today.

"We're counting on you if you can work 30 to 40 hours a week visiting households and interviewing the residents," Berla said, adding that some evening and Saturday work will be required.

Census takers will begin work soon as part of the 1980 Census of Population and Housing. They will attend a training session for which they will be paid. Most census takers will be paid a piece rate for the number of household interviews completed. In a few instances, pay will be by he hour. For all workers, pay will

average \$4 an hour or more. Census takers must be able to follow printed instructions, do simple arithmetic, and read maps for which they will be tested before hiring. They should be able to walk a considerable amount, climb stairs, and ought to have good eyesight and hearing. They should have a home telephone and many will need a car, for which mileage will be paid when it is used in the census work.

Many of the social reform programs that have been inflicted upon us during the past decade were passed with the best of intentions but there is one major fault to be found with them. They don't work fairly for everyone. No absolute set of rules for programs of this kind can operate with no deviations to fit individual cases. May we cite a few instances?

The Michigan State Unemployment Program has become somewhat of a joke in many places. Its cost is much higher than those of nearby states and in practice it leaves much to be desired. For instance our food stamp program, administered by the state, is in some instances at least, a who operates a small business in the recreation area near here. His place is open from the middle of May until Labor Day. I guess he does quite well financially during the summer but come Labor Day, he closes up shop and marches down to Social Services to apply for Food Stamps. Where he stashes his summer's profits, if any, I know not but he has no bank account nor cash on hand, so he is eligible for Stamps which he receives in quite some quantity all winter and does very nicely until the next May arrives. He even spends some time during the winter in

Florida. According to the rules concerning Food Stamps he is eligible to receive them if he has no income nor money and so he is given them. The administrators of the program are not to be criticized. They are going by the book. They must grant him the stamps.

And then there is the chap who, for several years, has been employed at a nearby golf course. Of course when cold weather comes his job vanishes for the winter and he immediately applies for food stamps and unemployment benefits and so lives rather in style, until spring, while many of the rest of us struggle with
