# HIT OR MISS by farley

Many of the social reform programs that have been inflicted upon us during the past decade were passed with the best of intentions but there is one major fault to be found with them. They don't work fairly for everyone. No absolute set of rules for programs of this kind can operate with no deviations to fit individual cases. May we cite a few instances?

The Michigan State Unemployment Program has become somewhat of a joke in many places. Its cost is much higher than those of nearby states and in practice it leaves much to be desired. For instance our food stamp program, administered by the state, is in some instances at least, a who operates a small business in the recreation area near here. His place is open from the middle of May until Labor Day. I guess he does quite well financially during the summer but come Labor Day, he closes up shop and marches down to Social Services to apply for Food Stamps. Where he stashes his summer's profits, if any, I know not but he has no bank account nor cash on hand, so he is eligible for Stamps which he receives in quite some quantity all winter and does very nicely until the next May arrives. He even spends some time during the winter in

Florida. According to the rules concerning Food Stamps he is eligible to receive them if he has no income nor money and so he is given them. The administrators of the program are not to be criticized. They are going by the book. They must grant him the stamps.

And then there is the chap who, for several years, has been employed at a nearby golf course. Of course when cold weather comes his job vanishes for the winter and he immediately applies for food stamps and unemployment benefits and so lives rather in style, until spring, while many of the rest of us struggle with

Further action is promised but it never seems to happen and you keep your job and your salary and all the other privileges of your office and you proceed to run for re-election.

# **News of Good Things** Growing

Rhubarb, the first food crop harvested in our state in spring, will soon be appearing in markets around the state to kick off another great season of "good things growing in Michigan!"

Rhubarb production is on the up-swing again after years of decline caused by increased harvesting costs and labor shortages. Research into the use of mechanical harvesting equipment has had some success and now three harvesters are operating in the United States, one of which is in Michigan.

Our state's growers harvested an estimated 200 acres in 1979, to obtain 3.6 million pounds and to rank Michigan second only to Washington for rhubarb production, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Hothouse rhubarb totaled 750,000 pounds, more than half of the nation's supply. Growers force rhubarb in hotlouses to extend the marketing season from January until field rhubarb is marketed in May. This variety is as tasty as the field crop and is a pink to rosy-red, rather than the dark red color.

Rhubarb must be grown for two years prior to its first harvest. If part of this crop is to be put into hothouse production, mature roots are dug up and left on the ground to freeze and remain dormant until about December 1. Roots are then placed in low windowless buildings, usually 150 feet long by 30 feet wide, where high humidity and a temperature of 55 degrees are maintained. Stalks are carefully cut

every two to five days to minimize waste. after they reach about 24 inches in height. Rhuberb stalks are perfectly safe to

consume (an eight inch pie requires about two pounds) but MDA Food Inspection officials warn that rhubarb leaves should not be eaten. They contain oxalic acid, a

The rabies problem in the United States is measured not so much by the number of human deaths as by the number of persons who require treatment - more than 30,000 persons each year are bitten by suspected rabid animals and are required to take treatment.

For example, 1980 the coded tags are red hearts. The duration of the rables vaccine depends on the type of vaccine and the species. Most vaccines for cats are 12 good up to 36 months.


