For instance, as we reported in an article some time ago, during the depression days of the 1930's, our welfare problem was handled by the township supervisor who knew his people per sonally and who gave those who needed it help and who prevented a lot of chiseling by some that didn't. Now however, the supervisor has been stripped of his powers and the welfare problems are handled on a county, state and national basis by people who don't know the real needs of their applicants, and although those administrators are trying to do a good job they cannot judge each case, they must do so by the "book" and that just doesn't work in many cases. So nowadays we read of many, many cases of people who have received food stamps, for instance, who are in no way eligible. The administrators cannot individually investigate all applicants. This didn't happen in

Another minor incident which, however indicates the trend of affairs is that in Community Education indicates the trend of affairs is that in 1975 the national, state and county ballots were combined on one sheet. Prior to this time each branch of the government issued separate ballots and handled their own election procedures which were. of course, handled by a law which covered them all. This 'twas said was done to "save money", a favorite expression used casually when new laws are passed, but 'tisn't always true. This combined ballot was to be under the jurisdiction of the County Clerk, and it eliminated the townships from the picture.

They must have forgotten at this time, about villages and cities, for they weren't included, and so they continued to hold elections under their former status; with the village elections held under the jurisdiction of the village clerks.

At this time our village clerk br us, as usual, copy for the village ballots and told us to print them as we had done for many years previously in their proper form, according to the law in those cases.

This we did but by the time we had done so, back came the clerk who said he and had a call from the County Clerk who said she wanted to have the copy for the village ballots. He told her what he had done with it and she insisted that she wanted to be certain that they were okay before they were printed so took a proof of them and he departed to show her what had been done.

In the meantime we contacted the village attorney and asked if there had been any changes in the election law and he said no that the County Clerk had nothing to do with village affairs, so we printed the ballots and things went as

Shortly thereafter we sold the printery and proceeded to forget about such matters, but as time went on quite a number of people kept calling us and asking if we could get for them printed matter of various kinds, that they could not get them locally anymore. So we finally succumbed and found sources for printer

Senior Citizens Tax Rebate

Income tax day has passed, but people 65 and older are still eligible for property tax rebates of up to \$12,000 from the state of Michigan.

The Michigan Property Tax Rebate Program, enacted into law in 1973, permits home owners, renters and residents of some nursing homes to file for the years 1978 and 1979 until December 31.

W. de St. Aubin, Chairman of the Tax Counseling Program sponsored by the Washtenaw County Council on Aging said "It's not necessary to file a state or federal income tax return to take advantage of this program.

"Our tax aides have helped over 6000 people in the county get back two and one half million dollars in the past six years", St. Aubin said. The Tax Aid Program is a free service of WCCOA and reaches out to senior citizen groups and the homebound to assist in filing the claims.

"Twenty-five volunteers, mostly seniors, have been specially trained by the Michigan Treasury Department to give advice on how to fill out the forms and assist in making the calculations", St. Aubin explained. "My biggest thrill, he said, was when I helped an impoverished woman living in a nursing home get back \$125 a couple years ago." So far this year WCCOA has helped about 650 people.

"Our big concern, St. Aubin said, is that many people think the deadline on the tax rebate was April 15th, when they really have two years to file their property tax claim. The other thing we are worried about is that many seniors don't even know they can get money back".

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



HIT OR MISS by farley

Gasohol is big in the news nowadays. and as usual with all things new and at least somewhat different there are many objections to its use and practicability, and we have "experts" who are positive that it is the answer to at least a large part of our energy problems and those who are sure that it takes more energy to produce it than it will generate.

This action by the "experts" is nothing new. I'm sure that you remember that it was not practical for Henry Ford to produce an economical automobile that was affordable by the average man, but he, without even being an engineer, didn't realize that he couldn't do it and so he just went ahead and did it. In the process of so doing he developed the assembly line of producing automobiles which has proven to be the basis of economical production ever since.

And then too, the Wright Brothers, it was said, could never produce an airplane that would fly. It was proven, on paper, that such a machine was impractical but the Wrights evidently weren't experts and so made one that was successful even though it was deemed impossible.

And then I'm sure that you remember the classic example related about Knudsen of General Motors who, when that company was developing a diesel locomotive, went before a group of engineers who said a practical locomotive of the type that they were trying to produce, couldn't be made, and he preceeded to place before the group the data listing the body weight and the bulk of a bumble bee as related to its wing span area and proved definitely that one could not in any manner, fly-it was impossible. And then Mr. Knudsen is said to have smiled and said "Don't tell the bumble bee, let him keep on flying.' Our history is full of accomplishments made by folks that were so uninformed that they didn't know they couldn't do certain things and o they just went ahead and lo and behold, they did 'em.

Let's hope this is true with gasohol Some studies have shown that gasohol is impractical because it takes more energy to make it from corn than is gained from the resulting fuel. But this conclusion fails to take into consideration that improvements in the manner of manufacture Poppy Day probably will be made nor that other May 16 & 17 sources than corn are available for its production. Other agricultural products such as spoiled grain, citrus wastes and cheese whey, it has been proven can also be used.

The Federal Department of Energy says that great improvements in the production of gasohol are not far away. But Worldwatch Institute concludes that use of grain for ethanol would drive world prices upward causing malnutrition among the poor, while gasohol proponents claim that its production does not change the protein content of corn and that it may be fed to livestock.

The use of alcohol as automotive fuel is nothing new. In the 1930's millions of cars ran on gasoline and alcohol blends and racing cars burned methyl alcohol or methanol but it took the 1970's energy crisis to rediscover alcohol as an automobile fuel. So let's quit worrying so much about whether it really saves energy. The energy that it produces is right here in our back yard where we can control it, and make us at least self sufficient. Let's make use of what we use to call "Yankee Ingenuity" to help to once
