



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

Starting August 1, 1960, you may be able to apply for food stamps at your local Social Security Administration (SSA) Office instead of your local Department of Social Services (DSS) Office.

You can apply for food stamps at your SSA office if you and everyone who lives and eats with you are: (1) applying for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits, or (2) receiving SSI Benefits.

Your SSA office will send your applica tion to your DSS office. That office will tell you, within 30 days, whether you can get food stamps.

This service is intended to make it easier for you to get food stamp benefits. If you wish, you may still apply at your

Q. What proof of age and other dee umentation are required when registering a child for school?

A. Local school boards set their own requirements for proof of age or other documentation needed when registering children, but in most cases a birth certificate will be required.

Birth certificates can be obtained from the State Department of Public Health, in the state where your child was born, by filing a written application for such certif icate and paying a nominal fee.

Q. Who evaluates the experience students who have attended school in another state or school district to determine at which grade level they should be

A. Local schools in Michigan are authorized to determine the grade level at which a child should be placed and the subjects which each child should be

physical examination, many schools require that children undergo physical ex-aminations before entering school for the

State law does require all children enrolling in Michigan schools for the first time to subsalt either a statement signed by a physician that the child has been immunised against childhood diseases; a statement signed by a parent or guardian that a child has not been immunised because of religious or other objections: or a physician's statement saying that a specific immunization is or may be detrimental to the child's health.

Prior to school entry, parents or guardians of each child must also submit a statement signed by a district, county or city health department director stating that the child has passed the Department of Health preschool vision and hearing screening tests; or a statement signed by a physician or optometrist indicating that the child's eyes and ears have been examined during the preschool years. Vision and hearing tests are not required if there is a statement signed by a parent or guardian objecting to such tests because of religious convictions.

Q. Is there anything I can do to help my children when they begin school or transfer to a new school?

A. As a parent you are the most important influence in your child's life! Your positive feelings about school will help to alleviate your child's fears and anxieties. By helping your child to regard school as a challenge and a happy expersmoothly. Parents that take an interest in their youngster's educational and social activities in school make a genuine and positive contribution to the child's development.




