Tucked away in the corner of the news dispatches recently there was one which noted the fact that Shirley Brown of Wakefield, Mass., had charged that her husband William had been "careless and negligent in the maintenance of the walks" and had failed to leave them in a safe condition for his wife. She also maintained that it was part of her husband's duties and responsibilities to keep the walks clear and prevent them from getting

I didn't imagine this case, it really happened. Mrs. Brown charged that William had shoveled the sidewalk before he went to work, but at about 8:00 a.m. Mrs. Brown left the house and had slipped on the shoveled walk and had fallen, breaking a pelvic bone.

This incident was eagerly seized upon by several columnists and editorial writers who noted that for many years the courts had been very reluctant to allow "spouses" to sue each other for negligence so that now Brown vs. Brown opened up a whole new horizon for the lawyers and the insurance companies and it seems that all home owner policies will have to be rewritten and of course, the rates will be much higher.

One columnist notes that if a wife can sue a husband for neglecting his household chores, a husband surely could sue his wife for neglecting hers, and he gives a couple of examples as follows:

"Under English common law one of wife's duties is to put out the trash. Recently I was playing with the dog and I tripped over a plastic trash bag that my wife had carelessly thrown in the driveway, and I scraped my elbow severely. Had I known then about the Brown vs Brown case I would have called my lawyer and filed suit immediately, but being ignorant of my rights I only warned her that if she couldn't do a better job with television after she had done the dishes.

change the motor on the garbage disposal 428-7911. unit which seems a simple job that any housewife could do but when I came home from playing golf she and all the parts of Manchester Fair the motor were sitting on the floor and she was crying, and I had to pay a man \$219 to do it right. This was certainly a simple case of negligence in maintainence of the household equipment and I think that any all-male jury in the land would rule in my favor had I but known of my vested rights and taken it to court.

"And then, just a couple of weeks ago my wife was up on a ladder painting the kitchen ceiling and when I walked by on my way to the refrigerator to get a can of me on the foot, causing me much pain and anguish in my toes. It seems that she had failed to put up a sign warning passersby that she was painting the ceiling and in so doing had violated every safety regulation in the book. Had I known about this Massachusetts court rulling I would have served her with a subpoena on the spot." I know that some folks will say that this


