

Waterloo Area Farm Museum

The Waterloo Area Farm Museum 1998 Waterloo-Munith Road, is the only one of its kind in Michigan and is on the National Register of Historic Places. From Ann Arbor the museum is a delightful forty minute drive through the country to the northwest. Seventeen years ago roup of enthusiastic citizens formed the Waterloo Area Historical Society. The Society has restored and furnished a farm ouse and outbuildings as a tribute to the Michigan Pioneer Farmer between the years 1844 and 1896. Volunteers started the museum and now maintain it. The artifacts have been lovingly donated by area residents. For the one-time visitor the museum provides a unique look into our pioneering past.
