



#### Deer Hunter Traffic Heaviest Since '75

Northbound traffic the day before the firearm deer season opens on Saturday (Nov. 15) should be the heaviest in five years, but hunters should encounter few travel problems, according to Automobile Club of Michigan.

"This is the first season since 1975 that opening day will fall on a Saturday," explained Auto Club Touring Manager Joseph Ratke.

"And despite rising gasoline costs and a trend towards increased pressure in southern Michigan, most of the state's 700,000-plus orange army will be heading for the northern two-thirds of the state on Friday, (Nov. 14)," Ratke said.

State Department of Natural Resources officials predict that approximately 80,000 buck deer will be taken over the 15-day season. That total is about 10 percent below last year's due to population drops caused by the harsh winters of 1977 and 1978. In all, nearly 118,000 buck and antierless deer should be bagged by Nov.

"The only traffic problem hunters may face is along I-75 near the Zilwaukee Bridge north of Saginaw," Ratke said.

Periodic slowdowns could result both north and south of the span, where three lanes of traffic merge into two. To help cut the possibility of further jams, Saginaw River shippers have been asked to voluntarily restrict movements causing bridge openings during peak traffic hours Nov. 14 and 16.

Auto Club preducts that northbound deer hunter traffic should be heaviest between 2 p.m. and midnight Friday (Nov. 14), and 5 a.m. and 5 p.m. on Saturday (Nov. 15). Southbound hunters on Sunday (Nov. 16) will find heavy traffic between 2 and 11 p.m.

While hunter-vehicle crossings have been dropping in recent years, Mackinac Bridge officials expect volume to nearly equal last year's total of 18,000 before the season ends on Nov. 30.

Auto Club reminds hunters that they must wear either a hat, vest or coat of

blaze orange to hunt public lands.

Auto Club will provide traffic bulletins via radio for traveling hunters between 8 a.m. and 11 p.m. on Friday (Nov. 14) and rom 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday (Nov. 15) in addition to its weekly road condition reports from 2 to 11 p.m. on Sunday (Nov. 16).

## "This Week In Lansing"

REVENUES DOWN, WELFARE CASE-LOADS UP:

Recently-released state tax revenue figures for September indicate that the State of Michigan is in bad financial shape, and getting worse.

To add to the state's woes, welfare caseloads are climbing past the level that would have been anticipated during only the most dire economic circumstances.

The monthly figures for September, which were released a week or so ago, indicate a drop in every source of revenue except liquor sales taxes, a sign, I think, of the times.

If the state's economy does not improve soon, Michigan may be in real trouble.

Dr. Gerald Miller, director of the state Department of Management and Budget, is still hopeful that Michigan can meet the 1980-81 revenue projections of nearly \$4.6 billion, despite the current unanticipated decline.

Here's a rundown on declining revenue sources for September:

-income tax withholdings fell 3.6 percent compared to last September. The income tax provides half the state's general fund money.

-income tax refunds, which are based on property tax credits, continue to grow. The 1980-81 estimate was \$606 million, but if things continue as they are, \$680 million could be more like it.

-sales tax collections, the state's second largest revenue source, were up 1 percent on all items minus automobile sales, but the sales tax on vehicles was down an astonishing 41 percent.

In order to balance the budget to operate through September 30, 1981, the last day of the fiscal year, I'm sure a move will be made when the Legislature reconvenes on November 12 to pass a \$100 million (tax hike) package.

The House Republicans have pledged not to raise taxes in 1980, and I doubt if there are 56 to 70 democrats willing to support the proposal.

The other side of the coin is that Aid to Dependent Children (ADC) caseloads increased by 2,900 in September to reach a total of 287,000. Governor Milliken expected 242,000 by the end of the year, but it looks like we'll reach that figure by the end of November.







#### Free Diabetic Tests

Free blood tests to detect disbetes will be offered by 165 Michigan hospitals and health centers during Diabetes Detection Week on November 16-22. The statewide testing program is co-sponsored by the American Diabetes Association-Michigan Affiliate (ADA-M) and is open to persons 18 years or older.

According to Dr. Nancy Caputo of Detroit, ADA-M's Detection Chairman, diabetes can produce severe complications if left untreated and yet may be present without symptoms. An estimated 200,000 persons in Michigan are diabetic and don't

Persons who run a high risk of developing diabetes are over forty, overweight, and related to diabetics. They should be checked once a year for diabetes, advises

Diabetes is a serious disease that is a major cause of heart attack, kidney failure. blindness and death. The symptoms Manchester of diabetes, when present, may include frequent urination, abnormal thirst, un- Lunch Menu usual hunger, rapid weight loss, itching, fatique, blurred vision, and slow healing of cuts and scratches.

Since diabetes is best detected after a meal high in sugars and starches, one of & Butter, Lettuce salad, Pears, Milk. the following suggested meals should be eaten two hours before taking the test, to ensure an accurate reading.

BREAKFAST: Fruit or juice, cereal with milk and sugar, two slices of buttered toast with jam, and coffee or tea. LUNCH: Bowl of soup, a sandwich, cake

or pie, and a glass of milk. The meal should be eaten within a 15-minute time period with nothing else taken before the test, except for water.

The Diabetes Association asks that persons being tested bring along the name and address of their physician in the event that follow-up is needed. All persons who test positive will hear from the Association within eight weeks as will their
