



1. There is to be only one public hearing for zoning changes. It can be held by either the Planning Commission or the Legislative body. 2. The category of land use called "Special Land Use" must now be included in the ordinance rather than Conditioned Land Uses. In order for these Special Land Uses to be granted it must be demonstrated that they are harmonious with conditions of 50.06 and it is necessary to document this. All special Uses must have site plan review. All property owners within 300 feet of a proposed Special Land Use must be notified of a public Laurin F. Leeson, Secretary hearing in not less than 5 days but within

3. P.U.D.s must be either a separate district or treated as a Special Land Use. The village retains more control over development with a P.U.D. District and therefore this alternative was recom-

4. Site Plan Review must now be required for all P.U.D.s and Special Uses. The State also allows communities to require developers to purchase security bonds to cover protection of natural resources, roadways, screening, lighting, etc. as demonstrated on the approved site

5. Changes in the Board of Appeals must be made to make the composition of that body either the legislative body or 5 appointed community members. There is also an option of making P.U.D. approval appealable to the Board of Appeals. It was suggested that some communities may prefer not to do this.

6. There can now be different classifications of Non-Conformities with different guidelines. It was suggested that residential non-Conformities be differentiated from Commercial and Industrial. Communities now have the option to purchase and demolish Non-Conformities at their

Mr. Barkley stated that to bring our

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ordinance into compliance would require a considerable amount of rewriting and that this would, therefore, be a good time to fashion our ordinance more closely to the needs of a Village. He suggested writing out the section on minimum land requirements for P.U.D.s, clarifying non-conformities with specific classifications, rewriting definition of Board of Appeals, including a CBD District (as ours is

currently miszoned C-2 and must be rezoned C-1 or CBD), and review sign ordinance and parking provisions. Mr. Barkley will put his recommendations in report form and have it ready for the November 4 meeting of the Planning Commission. He also advised that the regulations in the ordinance regarding Mobile Home Districts have been superceeded by the State. In closing Mr. Barkley offered his services in planning matters in the future and advised that the Zoning Ordinance must be rigorously

Chairman Hinkley announced that the positions of Wellwood and Daniels on the Planning Commission were now vacant and that he had suggested Paul Alber and Jim Scully to fill them. President Schaffer will contact them.

Chairman Hinkley read a letter to Mark Gistinger from Tom Roberts regarding building a stockade fence around the bus located at 320 Riverside Drive. Member Bond is to meet with Gistinger to discuss zoning violations involved with such fence.

Possible zoning violations involved at 200 Riverside Drive were discussed and it was determined that there was not a violation in zoning ordinance until a non permitted use is actually begun.

The matter of sign review for the Silkworth and Mann service stations on Main Street was tabled until the next meeting to give Commission members the opportunity to research amendments to the Sign Ordinance.

Further discussion of the possible Industrial Park was postponed until the November 4th meeting when Clarence Fielder can be present. Mr. Fred Barkley will be asked to attend for guidance. It was announced that there are a couple of businesses interested in the Industrial

Dangerous Driving-Michigan drivers are entering the peak season for deer car accidents and the number of accidents is soaring each year. In 1979 the 16,148 deer-car accidents left three people dead. 870 injured and cost \$19.2 million in damage. They took a toll on the deer too. Some 99 percent of the deer involved were killed. Precautions? Stay alert and remember, deer travel in anall groups.

Hunting Season-About 750,000 hunters will go afield this fall to bag 110.000 to 150,000 of Michigan's herd of a million white-tail deer. The hunters will leave behind an average of \$200 to \$309 each in purchases of gas, groceries, taxes on private hunting lands, licenses, guns, ammunition and dozens of other items.

Lake Authority-The Michigan Department of Transportation wants a Lake Michigan Transportation Authority established to oversee future water transportation on the lake and put new life into the industry, rather than short-term subsidies for crosslake carferry service. It's up to

Budget Woos-Lame duck legislators face more severe budget cuts in order to balance the 1981 budget by January 1. The Governor has recommended additional budget cuts of \$288 billion, bringing the total to \$1 billion, insisting that a hike in taxes is unwise. The new round of cuts will result in the lavoffs of 1000 more state employees. Hard hit are education, mental health and state police under the Governor's latest plan.

Jobs Program-Michigan, in the worst economic slump in 40 years, has launched a \$75 million job and training program aimed at getting 36,000 people back to work and reducing the welfare caseload demands. The U.S. Department of Labor awarded a \$10 million grant to supplement the program and target some 6,000 general assistance recipients in counties most in need of help.



Have you ever been ambushed by a ed chicken? It's not pleasant. mon term for it is food poisoning. We mention food poisoning, because re like history repeating itself, reving the custom of picnics and potlucks, aring food with other people, carrying it our cars or on bikes to a central

eeting place. But, if that chicken-or meat, fish and gs-has not been refrigerated and operly cooked, the picnic can turn into a

Salmonella bacteria thrive in warm d, especially unrefrigerated meat, fish, ultry and eggs. When it's there, lurking the potato salad yellow with eggs, or ng in wait in the undercooked chicken, ware! You could get food poisoning

The symptoms don't appear for 12 to 36 od, but when they do, you know you've en attacked. There is sudden abdomina ir, severe diarrhea, nausea and vomitand if babies get it, they become ydrated. No matter what our age, we d medical attention immediately. After major attack is over, diarrhea and loss appetite continue for a few more days. salmonella has struck again.

Another suggestion is to keep your hands clean when preparing food and eating. It's not always easy outdoors, but play it safe, because the bacteria can take its toll there, too.

Food poisoning is one of the diseases that is reportable by law. When the local and State Health Departments know where the outbreaks are, they can detect the culprit food (especially in restaurants or wherever large numbers of people gather to eat), and inspect the premises against recurrence.

you don't want to play cops and robbers with salmonella, make sure i doesn't appear. Don't be tempted by that drumstick warming in the sun. Keep cold food cold, and hot food hot. Wash your hands, cook the food well, and keep refrigerated. Remember the password:

### Be Prepared For Winter Snow **Emergencies**

The American Red Cross, Washtensw County Chapter wishes to remind residents of the county to prepare and plan ahead for the snow season.

With the possibilitly of heavy winter snows closing roads, families should be sure that there is enough food on their shelves to feed them for at least three days, candles, a battery-operated radio and at least one week's supply of prescription medicine should be kept on hand at all times. Families with small children should have enough diapers and formula for at least three days.

Powdered milk, nutritious canned meals, canned fruits and vegetables are ecommended for non-refrigerated storage in times of emergency.

When traveling by automobile during the snow season, keep stored in the car items that can see you through a winter emergency; such as blankets, books (one you always meant to read), a bright flag to hang on antennae or hood, dried fruit or candy, garbage bags to help keep you warm, chains, a shovel, and emergency

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



### **News Of Good** Things Growing

Although you can't see butter, milk and cheese growing in the fields and being harvested, these products are also good things growing in Michigan!

About 400,000 dairy cows on 8,000 Michigan dairy farms supplied consumers with almost five billion pounds of milk in 1979 (about 563 million gallons), according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. Output per cow was a record 12,166 pounds last year, and that's enough milk to furnish eight families with a half gallon of milk each day for a year.

About one-third of the milk production was used in making 32 million pounds of butter, 46 million gallons of ice cream, ice milk and sherbet, and 80 million pounds of

Milk is the largest single item sold from Michigan farms, accounting for about a quarter of farmers' cash receipts, or \$582,498,000 last year. With processing. packaging, transportation and marketing costs added, this represents \$2.9 billion to the state's economy.

Michigan consumers are assured quality milk and manufactured dary products. Trained MDA inspectors routinely check parlors where cows are milked and milk house equipment on farms for sanitation. Only farms issued a state permit with sanitation approval may supply Grade A milk to dairies.

Out state was the first in the nation to adopt Grade A fluid milk laws, in 1965, which require all fluid milk bottled here to meet strict Grade A standards.

Dairy plants processing milk and manufacturing butter, and cheese processing plants are also routinely inspected by MDA for sanitation and quality.
