Conservationists, wildlife managers, and others who believe in protecting and ing wildlife, recognize trapping as the most efficient means of harvesting furbearers and controlling predators when is conducted by responsible trappers.

Such trappers: Obtain the landowner's permission before trapping on his land. Avoid setting traps in areas

iomestic animals may be caught. 3. Set their traps to kill quickly utilizing water sets where possible 4. Check their traps regularly and preferably in the early morning.

5. Identify and record their trap carefully and accurately as not to offend others.

7. Make an effort to concentrate trapping in areas where animals are overabundant for the supporting habitat.

8. Promptly report the presence diseased animals to wildlife authorities. 9. Assist farmers and other landowners who are having problems with predators.

10. Support and help train new trappers. 11. Support strict enforcement of regulations including trapping seasons and the reporting of all takes to state or provincial







There is much information that can be very useful if remembered when witnessing a violation. If a car is involved, note the make, model, color and license number, as well as any distinctive damage on the automobile. If you can see the violators, remember their clothing, facial fea-

Writing the facts down on paper can help in a better recollection of the incident. Often, when excited, observers can forget to look for or record the necessary information. Above all, remember that you are not a law enforcement officer, so do not attempt to take direct action. You may be held responsible for your actions if you unlawfully detain a







We can be well prepared for the big things are overlooked and knock us out of mission. Take the hunters this season,

A good hunter knows the proper clothes to wear, how to handle the guns and read the compass, is alert to hazardous weather on the trail, and retains contact with his or her hunting companions.

What even an experienced hunter might

overlook is one simple item that could turn an exhilarating hunting trip into a tragedy, namely, the condition of the heating unit in the cabin, camper, or

The heating unit may not be used very often and, as a result, could have develop ed a faulty condition that could create carbon monoxide and be a threat to life. Each year we have reports of hunters who

have been overcome by carbon monoxide, some of them fatally. You can't see it, or mell it. When carbon monoxide is abroad, good night's sleep could-and sometimes

The most dangerous appliances are the ntermittently used gas-fired appliance and any unvented unit. A wood stove or fireplace also can emit carbon monoxide, even more when the fire diminishes to glowing embers. At that level the fire chimney and permeates the room with carbon monoxide instead.

Make it a point this year to check the heating unit before you need it. Play it safe. Don't let the little things knock you out of commission. In this case, the little thing could be the biggest thing in your





Andrea and Jill are the daughters of Bob and Gail Henry of 346 Fairmont at Whitmore Lake just two miles from the Livingston County border. The girls are very close and enjoy playing games in their back yard. Andrea is always striving to do the same things her sister does, resulting in the strengthening of her body.

Jill recently took a tumble and bit through her tongue but Andrea did most of the crying! Sheriff Minick said that one out of every 12 infants born in this country this year will have a birth defect.







A planetary visitor would be hard put to explain what he saw if his spaceship set down during the Christmas season. "What's it all about, Alfie?" Confusion may well reign for the visitor, as to the meaning of such hustle and bustle.

But when we ask ourselves question, "What is it all about?" we may often be as confused as our man from Mars. For we receive a variety of signals which indicate a real tension between the secular and the religious aspects of the

We're pulled in a variety of directions. with shopping, cooking and family preparations on one hand; a breadwinner's eeling guilty about not providing emough income to buy all the things he'd like to give his family; divorced or widowed people who haven't a partner to share the season with: Church's preachers who sometimes make us feel embarrassed if we can't always experience the "true meaning" of Christmas; loneliness and isolation are heightened for many, as we see others about us who seem to be

together and close. Is there no escape from these difficult feelings and tatered emotions? The "Good" news of the birth of Jesus Christ almost becomes a trite and easy non-answer to the "hard" news of guilt and anxiety and frustration that holiday times often

But we are told by the writer of Hebrews that "Faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen." The hopes and fears of all the years can indeed be met on that Holy Night in Bethlehem, with a faith in God which allows us to see what is unseen, and to know what is unthinkable-that the Presence of God is with us, now and forever. And we have been given this "Good" news of the birth of a Savior, precisely so that we can survive all the 'hard" news around us.

May the strength and beauty of faith, and the gift of the Son of God, bless each of us this Christmas and always.
