





It's National Cherry month, and aren't we lucky to be living in the state which includes the Cherry Capitol of the World. In Traverse City, of course, people like to remind their visitors that Michigan grows more than 75 percent of all the nation's Lung Disease red tart cherries

Cherries are among the good things Symptoms growing in Michigan, and last year we produced 158 million pounds of red tart cherries, 58 million pounds of sweet cherries, according to the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

February is National Cherry month because of George Washington's legendary youthful encounter with the cherry tree. But Michigan's versatile cherries are delicious to eat and delightful to see any

If you've limited your use of red tart cherries to pies, let me suggest another dessert, deceptively simple to prepare and truly elegant. I'm almost embarrassed when guests ask for this recipe, because it's so easy, and they think I've spent hours creating a masterpiece.

This is a Black Forest torte, but it's more impressive if you use the German diseases. name, Schwartzwalder Kirschtorte.

Bake your favorite dark chocolate cake in two layers. After they've cooled, carefully slice them in half, so you have four layers. Sprinkle each with about a tablespoon of kirsch, a cherry-flavored liqueur. (That's the real secret, because it moistens the cake layers.)

Chronic lung disease killed more than 800 people in Michigan between January and June of 1980, according to John C. Howell, PhD, president of the American Lung Association of Michigan (ALAM).

Howell said that according to the ALAM, people with serious chronic lung disease almost always start out with mild



Their biggest enemy many teachers say is not present in the classroom and is not the parent of any child. It is the television set in the student's house.

Like the teachers many physicians say that children who are heavy television viewers are the worse students-aggressive, easily distracted and lacking in imagination and in reading ability. The heavy viewers are the ones who can't sit still and who can't listen to a story without squirming and interrupting but if a film is shown they will sit and stare at it

Experts testify that television violence makes children more wisling to hurt people and to be more aggressive in their play. All of the bumping, zapping, chasing, squashing, shooting and punching have an

For several generations the daily use of print and radio caused the person seeing and listening to it to congure up pictures because these media left the pictorial part of the image incomplete, but the viewer


had made up his own pictures. Television. however, delivers a picture to the viewer who don't have to participate in any picture-making activity.

According to Dorothy Cohen, professor of early childhood development, "Children whose lives are a kaledioscope of changing figures and inconsistent developments, or children whose environment is heavily dominated by the frantic speed and pace of television, are children very likely to be distracted. For them focusing and paying attention are a strain."

Television however has shown the children the moon and the floor of the sea and on "Sesame Street" they have seen people of many backgrounds playing together and cooperating.

But nowadays schools must deal with the effects of heavy and habitual television viewing by children whose preschool experiences are higher than ever before and whose skills have evidently shifted as a result.
