
> Vision Week (March 1-7) message. It takes 20/20 eyesight and many other vision skills to do that fast and accurately

Those other skills include the abilities to see out of the corner of the eye; see sharply and clearly at a distance when you, the opponent or ball are in motion; quickly and accurately judge distances between your self and the opponent, ball, target or boundaries; use the eyes to follow a moving object smoothly and easily; and coordinate hand, foot and body movements with what


the eves see. Dr. Fitzpatrick said anyone who enjoys sports should be certain these vision skills are checked when they have an optometric examination. If skills are lacking or lagging, prescription lenses, vision therapy or both may be used to bring them up to par.

Although sports performance may not always give clues to a need for vision care. Dr. Fitzpatrick said some things to look for are frequently missing easy plays, squinting, inconsistent performance from game to game and difficulty playing under lights indoors or outdoors.







seems that we have to re-evaluate a lot of things that we once took on faith. X-rays fall into that category. So common were X-rays a generation ago that some shoe stores X-rayed children's feet reposing inside new shoes to assure the proper fit. Not so today.

Today, the best advice is to avoid all unnecessary X-rays. Don't stop on your own to be X-rayed at a mobile unit; and don't insist that your doctor and dentist schedule X-rays for you. Let the professionals determine whether the

benefit outweights the risk. If you have had X-rays, tell your doctor and dentist. The old ones might be used in place of the new, or they might be used with the new to compare the change in your

If you're pregnant, or even suspect that you might be pregnant, tell your doctor. X-rays of the lower torso might be harmful to the fetus; however, if the doctor knows your condition and still recommends X-ray, comply. Your doctor must make the determination whether the benefits of a clear diagnosis of your condition outweigh the risk to the fetus.

Women are not alone in their concern for X-rays of the lower torso. Men, too, require special consideration. When males are having X-rays of the lower abdomen, lower back, or kidneys, the reproductive organs should be protected with a leaded shield. If radiation harms the reproductive cells of either sex, the damage may be passed on to

future generations. Just what does X-ray do to the cells? It disturbs their function. Even short, infrequent doses of radiation are potentially harmful, although the cells can repair themselves to some degree. Large doses of X-ray can damage the cells beyond repair. and may induce cancer.

X-rays can't be seen, heard, touched, tasted, or smelled, but they carry more clout then we once thought they did. Two things come out of the re-evaluation of the facts: avoid unnecessary X-rays, and let the professional weigh the benefits against the risks. That is the most recent information we must take on faith.



The main danger of infection is long term exposure in a closed environment which has been contaminated by a person with untreated TB. Not great, this risk does exist for those who spend several weeks in areas where TB is prevalent.

Any traveler who anticipates possible prolonged exposure to TB should have a TB skin test before leaving. If the test is negative, a repeat test after return will tell whether the traveler has become infected. Those who suspect they have been exposed to TB during travel should tell their doctors

The Christmas Seal people, the experts on TB for 75 years, say the disease should be taken seriously by those who might encounter it. Modern medicines can prevent and cure TB, but only when properly taken. For more information contact the American Lung Association of Michigan. It's a matter of life and breath.



Application forms currently on file will be reviewed to determine if eligibility will continue, change to another category, or terminate. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space of signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to deduction and save, on a Joint Return, warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of Federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application. ONLY: and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable State and criminal statutes.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

Children of unemployed parents may qualify for free or reduced price meals and/or free milk if total family income include welfare payments, unemployment compensation and sub-pay benefits fall within the prescribed family income guidelines. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, creed, color, or national origin.

## Levin To Co-sponsor Tax Credit Bill

Senator Carl Levin (D-Michigan) has co-sponsored a bill that will allow taxpayers a \$750 tax credit on their 1981 and 1982 returns with the purchase of a new American-made car or light truck.


The bill, introduced by Senator Dan Quayle (R-Indiana), is an attempt to stimulate American auto sales that have been hurt by Japanese imports. The crisis has saddled American auto manufacturers with a total of \$4 billion in losses in 1980.

Retroactive to January 1, 1981, and effective through December 31, 1981, the proposal will cost the U.S. Treasury \$2.5 billion. This cost, however, will be offset by the taxes from the re-employment of the 825,000 workers who have been laid off as a result of the crisis. An additional \$2 billion will be saved in benefits to unemployed



Giving the post office fits has become a way of life for a great many folks, especially those in the larger cities, but in spite of it's shortcomings we don't think those in our small towns are so bad, or wouldn't be if the high brass would not hamper them with

It's said that people don't write letters like they did years ago before they had competition from Ma Bell and United Parcel nor did they have to consider a nine digit

proposed zip code. Our literature contains some classics in the form of letters such as those written by Elizabeth Barrett Browning and her beloved. But in those days Liz didn't have to go to the post office because she was an invalid, a circumstance which many today would envy her.

On the post office in Washington, D.C., is described in stone, tis said, the slogans "Messenger of Sympathy and Love" and "Servant of Parted Friends", but these inscriptions are badly eroded of late.

It's said that nowadays 84 percent of the mail is of business, not personal in character.

A recent column by Mary McGrory lays this condition to the decline in service and the inhospitality at the post office. This just isn't so here at our post office. A clerk the other day even smiled sweetly when she refused to lick a stamp for us when we asked her to because our tongue was very

fuzzy that morning. Besides the resentment of the nine digit zip code the projected twenty cents for first class postage and the projected demands for higher demands by postal workers for higher wages and the estimate that the cost of installing the new zip code is estimated at \$900 million, the public doesn't care whether or not it will be recovered by
