

Tornado Procedures At Manchester Schools

The Manchester Community Schools are informing the community of tornado procedures as follows: . Tornado Watch - Definition

The U.S. Weather Bureau issues a Tornado Watch for areas where tornadoes may occur during the next several hours. The size of an average Tornado Watch area is approximately 100 miles wide and 300 miles long. Procedure

1. If the tornado watch is broadcast before 1:30 p.m.; all children will be sent home and all school activities cancelled.

2. If the tornado watch is broadcast after 1:30 p.m., all children will be dismissed at

their regular time. 2. Tornado Warnings

A Tornado Warning means that a tornado has actually been sighted in the area or its presence has been detected by radar. The tornado warning will indicate the location where the tornado was sighted, the area through which it is expected to move, and the time period during which the tornado will move through the area warned. Procedure

1. Children will not be dismissed from school. Appropriate safety measures will be taken.

2. If a tornado warning is in effect at the normal end of the school day, children will not be dismissed, but will remain at their emergency stations.

3. Parents may personally pick up their children during a Tornado Warning. Parents must check with school office before taking the child.

4. Neighbors will not be permitted to pick up other children unless a written statement giving permission to release the youngsters to a neighbor has been filed in the school office.





Coffee Break News

Prison Overcrowding - Under a new law, nearly 1,000 prisoners may be released from Michigan prisons in the next three months. The Governor must declare an emergency if prisons remain overcrowded over 30 days. If the prison capacity falls to 6% after 90 days, the emergency can be

Minor Working Restricted - A law to prohibit minors from working after sunset or 8 p.m. in businesses where money changes hands, unless an adult is present. took effect March 31. Under the law a youth can, for example, coilect for a paper route but is unable to work at a grocery store unless an adult is present. The law amends the Mich. Youth Unemployment Stands. Act.

Economic Education - Legislation to require the teaching of the free enterprise system in Michigan high schools has been introduced by State Representative Edgar Geerlings (R-Norton Shores). The bill would require the State Board of Education to develop a curriculum for local school districts in teaching a one-semester course in the essentials and benefits of a free enterprise system.

Lean Program - An \$80 million loan program utilizing Michigan retirement funds to finance home mortgages in Michigan is being established, Governor Milliken recently announced. The program, developed by the state Department of Treasury, is expected to boost Michigan's housing and construction industries. Through its retirement funds, the Department of Treasury will loan money to financial lending institutions in the state, who will in turn loan money for the purchase of existing home mortgages and the financing of new ones.

Hiring Freeze - In an effort to cut \$80 million from the state budget, Governor Milliken imposed a six-month freeze on hiring in state agencies. The freeze will last at least until September 30 and could reduce the 66.800 member state work force up to 7.5 percent.

Handgun Control - Tougher handgun controls should be seriously considered, Governor Milliken said recently in response to the shooting of President Reagan. Milliken, who had not taken a specific stand on the control issue in the past, has supported stiff penalties for crimes committed with guns and feels more stringent measures may be required if that does not prove effective.






